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INTER CENTRE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Sunday the 30th January and Basildon was to play host to the SEBA Intercentre Championships. Four Centres had entered, Basildon, Bexleyheath, Dagenham and Cliftonville. Each Centre had chosen 18 bowlers to challenge the holders Bexleyheath for the right to keep the

trophy until 1984.

First event was the Junior Fours, Bexleyheath and Basildon were drawn on lanes 1 and 2. It proved to be something special for the Bexleyheath Team, three personal best scores from Clive Bentley 189,203,205 for 597. Elaine Lodge not daring to smile each time she made a strike for fear that her form would disappear any minute scored 190,200,193 for 583. Robert Petherick appearing to take it all in his stride with 174,174,172 for his personal best 520. Terry Munson with a workman like 517. Their team games were 742-774-701 for 2217 and 10 points. Basildon was 2nd taking 6 points. Tony Pavelin was their top scorer 196-199-185 for 580. Third Dagenham and 5 points, Dean Saunders and a personal best 165,189,152 for 506 held them just in front of Cliftonville who opened their account with 4 points.

The ladies trios promised to be close with County bowlers representing each centre. Basildon were in the lead after two games, with Cliftonville only 10 pins down. Basildon's Linda Payne, Marion Drury and Lil McNamara hit a disastrous 425 last game and finished last. Cliftonvilles trio, Joyce Champan, Sylvia Colley and Kim Berwick hit 510 for a 3 game total of 1504 and 10 points. Dagenhams trio last game 527 - 1469 was enough to keep Bexleyheath in 3rd place by 4 pins.

Jenny & Roy Myhill made a good start in the mixed doubles, Roy scoring 232, Jenny 189 for 421 set their Dagenham team on the right path for 10 points. They maintained their lead in the 2nd game. Carol Wynn and Gary Steventon was 36 pins down on the Dagenham pair, 355 was a good score but not enough to take 10 points away from Roy and Jenny.

The mens doubles also saw County Team Members representing their centre. Terry Saunders had to fair well after his son had bowled a personal best. Terry, more than ably assisted by Pete Butcher led from start to finish. Terry qualified for the Failure Club with 223,139,203 @ 565; Basildon's Jes Morley and Kevin Males were 2nd, with only 5 pins in front of Bexleyheath's Alan Kirk and Dave Wain. Last for 4 points Mick Chapman and Steven Drury from Cliftonville.

After four events the leader board read Dagenham 31, Bexleyheath and Cliftonville 24, Basildon 21

points.

3 events to go and all to play for. Next was the ladies singles, for Basildon Sue Morden, Bexleyheath Janet Morrison, Cliftonville Anne Simmonds, Dagenham Mary Saban. What more did we need. Sue Morden opened the proceedings with 177, only 1 pin in front of Janet and 12 pins up on Ann with Mary slightly out of touch from the leader. Second game and Mary found form with a 204 game, and was now only 11 pins adrift of Sue, with Anne only 3 pins behind Mary. The last game was a fight to the finish, Janet found trouble with one or was it several splits, and fell by the wayside. The other three players trying hard not to miss a pin, a double or turkey by anyone would settle the issue. Sue Morden finally stamped her authority on the proceedings with 179 last game for a 536 series and 10 points for Basildon. Anne Simmonds 171-514, second place and 6 points from Cliftonville. Mary Saban 3rd and 5 points from Dagenham. Janet Morrison last with 4 points for Bexleyheath.

The mens singles held the same promises as the ladies, a fight to the finish. Laurie Walmsley from Cliftonville provided the early action with 195-211, 406 after two games, well in front of Basildon's Mick Ward, Bexleyheath's Steve Carnall. Bringing up the rear Billy Preston from Dagenham. Mick Ward applied the pressure to Laurie by scoring 199 for a 560 series, but Laurie had a 35 pin cushion after two games and Mick's challenge was fought of with 161 for a 567 series for Cliftonville's Laurie Walmsley and ten points. Mick Ward second, Steve Carnall 3rd, Billy Preston an unaccustomed 4th place. The leader board with only one event to go read Cliftonville and Dagenham 40 points, Basildon 37, Bexleyheath 33. The only team that could not win was Bexleyheath. Game one and Dagenham took the lead with 857, Alan Kersey scoring 219. Basildon three pins behind with 854. Cliftonville 19 pins behind the leaders. Second game and it was Basildons turn to take the lead, although the scores were not high, the competition was tense. After two games the scores read Basildon 1680, Dagenham 1644, Bexleyheath 1593 and Cliftonville loosing their grip on the trophy 1566. The Basildon team were all set to lay their hands firmly on the cup and led by Graham Warner with 244 hit 958 for a 2638 series.

Congratulations to the Basildon Team of Graham Warner, Bert Ballard, Keith Starbuck, Keith Pain, Ron Keeble 10 points. The Juniors Mark Presley, Tony Pavelin, Sharon Carter, Tracey Thorogood 6 points. Mixed doubles Ciss and Dennis Collings 5 points. Mens Doubles Jes Morley and Kevin Males 6 points. Ladies singles Sue Morden 10 points. Mens singles 6 points. Last and not least Ladies Trios Linda Payne, Marion Drury and Lil McNamara 4 points. The Dagenham Team was second with 46 points, Cliftonville third 45 points. Bexleyheath 37 points well beaten, and all in the Failure Club except the Juniors.

On behalf of all the bowlers and officials at Basildon, I would like to thank the Basildon Management and staff for all their assistance, we

had a good day.

Seventy nine teams entered the tournament that ran on the Sunday before and the Sunday after the Christmas weekend and they came from as far afield as Liverpool, Birmingham, Yarmouth and Poole. High score from week I was put by BT Bolwing Products with Colin Rackley hitting 590 backed by Peter Butcher 552 and Terry Saunders 523 for a total with handicap of 1869. This stood until the last squad when Terry re-entered with a make-up team of Mary Saban and Roy Myhill and proceeded to hit a 593 backed by 575 and 555 respectively from his team mates for a handicap total of 1924! This creditable total looked like staying the course with

the Cavaliers coming near with Roland Foxley firing 603 and backed by Dennis Walker and Nigel Holgate 523 for a handicap total of 1898 but it was to be the Liverpool team of N.W.S. who were to find Dagenham's lanes to their liking and make the top prize of £300.00. 11th National Conference of the CCPR Council of Physical Recreation

On a particularly cold, wet riproaring Wednesday afternoon, the weather was matched inside by an equally rip-roaring Sir Denis Follows, C.B.E., B.A. (Honorary Treasurer, C.C.P.R.) snapping at the receding heels of the Minster for Sport, Neil MacFarlane, M.P. There are no punches pulled at this conference.

The C.C.P.R. is, so to speak, the voice of the leaders of every sporting and recreational activity from soccer to skiing, cricket to chess, tenpin bowling to table tennis. To its platform came delegates with little in common but the desire to gather a few more crumbs from the cake of knowledge.

We are all short of money!

But with many of us there is a more desparate need — the need for **Recognition**, for some sign that the rest of us care.

"What do we have to do to break down the carrier of media resistance?" wailed Volleyball, sobbed Lacrosse "don't forget us" chipped in Tenpin Bowling, "we are alive kicking . . . and doing very well thank you, despite the media". And Frank Bough (BBC Television) in the chair for that session, responded with immaculate misjudgement "You mean you want to get on television?"

Hang about, this guy would be happy enough to get one line into the Press!

Of the sharper stuff of the week there was nothing more compulsively interesting (nor less publicised) that the governing body of a sport must Govern, it must show strength and sincere conviction from handling top performers to administrative responsibility.

Touching on a more pleasant note, a special award was presented to David Hunn (Observer Sports Page). In accepting his award he said "I love cricket, soccer, rugby and athlectics but what touches my heart is to go out to what other people in the press think are the most extra-ordinary events. (Yes, yes, D.H. has been to, at least three of our National Championships). He continued, "but I know they are the most marvellous occasions where every week people in their thousands show love and determination for their sport. David Hunn! you are, in the truest sense of the word, a champion of sport.

From the woman's angle — Women in sport was glanced upon briefly. Apparently we are very important to sponsors, in as much as — we choose the second car in the family, we buy the groceries, we influence our little boys (and girls!!), we have great potential. As far as women in administration are concerned, it was commented that we have a firmer, fairer idea of management and are unbeatable as far as reliable work is concerned.

One of the first lectures given was by Dr. Clyde Williams of the University of Technology (Loughborough) on the subject of Sports Science and its application to the development of sport. Graphs and transparancies were shown to illustrate the process of Body Energy Crisis and the effect of diet

in respect of this.

Without going into the fine details, a long report, briefly recommended that high carbohydrate meals, together with high protein will help to fuel the energy crisis suffered by high performance players, that consumption of glucose and the treatrical dramatics of gasping for water during an event, is purely psychological, anyone whose eating habits are correct should be able to

run a 26 mile marathon without aid.

After three long days (9 a.m. — 6.30 p.m.) of intense and varied lectures, question and arguments with the occasional lunch pill pushed under the door, we emerged quite drained mentally (happy to take my A levels again anytime in preference) but the knowledge

gleaned must be an asset to our sport and to you, our bowlers. After all, without the participants there would be no need for a National Association.

At an independent symposium of "The Governing Body", its structure, finance and responsibilities" your General Secretary learned from the discussion leader, George Cubitt, M.B.E. (General Secretary of the Camping Club of Gt. Britain and Ireland) that the C.C.G.B.I. with 190,000 members have an annual subscription of £11.00 (100,000) together with £7.50 (associate members 90,000) for which they receive a quarterly magazine, a cash discount on a number of items and very little else. The C.C.G.B.I. is a company limited by guarantee, it has local associations and a council consisting of 6 officers and 12 elected members. We were very happy to inform the meeting that the B.T.B.A. is set up on an almost identical pattern and it was commented that the B.T.B.A. is recognised as one of the most progressive and efficient National Association in the sport world (Cheers!)

Yet in another lecture hall your other delegate wrestled with the problems of temperamental, high performance players, amateurism v. professionalism PLUS governing body coaching and awards programmes. All food for thought, the meeting was expertly chaired by Mrs. Mary Glen Haig C.B.E. (Vice President C.C.P.R.)

The next meeting will be on 23rd -25th November, 1983.

He had been discussing matters bowling with a fellow league member who happens to be a league bowler at Tolworth, hence his authoritarian view on the matter. You know how it goes, "I know! I bowl there!" I shall not attempt to justify Roy's assumptions, for it serves to prove that communications even between bowlers within a centre are inaccurate, and no doubt from the time the hearsay started, to the time it had arrived at Bexleyheath it had changed it's shape and form many times, and who can resist "Did You Hear?" But who is prepared to put the record straight and stop the rumours, apparently no one. The rest of the article rested upon open Government, and the need for state of the sport, authoritative statements. What's happening, where, to whom and why. Now before any one gets off their bike, let's settle one thing, TOLWORTH IS SANCTIONED. Their Tournaments may not be, but their lanes are. So are the lanes at Manchester's Belle Vue after a five year gap. So What! I can hear you say. So What! Five years that's what. It's approximately five years since Belle Vue was last sanctioned, and that means some one has had a change of heart or some differences have been cast aside, and BTBA Sanction has been restored. I don't know why it's been five years since Belle Vue was last sanctioned and I don't suppose I ever will, but I hope the reasons

were substantial and not solely based upon personalities. For if the reasons were based upon personalities that is irresponsible.

As a result of Roy's article I received several letters, well two to be exact. Both condemning my judgement in publishing such "unconfirmed rubbish as fact", my answer is simple, I do not publish Cool Corner as fact! It is included as comment, observations, even assumptions. Answer: 10p to the UK team.

In an attempt to make the UK Teams more self sufficient, the BTBA National Council decided to make a levy on tournaments of 10p per event, per person, so that UK team members may travel abroad without recoures to their own finances. There must be many aspiring Bowlers who would like to Bowl for the UK, but can't afford it. Unfortunately Tournament Managers did not like that decision.

The 10p has provided yet another excuse for not sanctioning Tournaments.

The usual excuse is, "It's only for the locals". What happens if one of the locals hits something big? or are local conditions so bad that's not likely.

It could be argued that the BTBA Council failed to consult with the proprietors before they took their decision, discourteous perhaps, but not out of order. Tournament Managers were not being asked to pay it for our members, only collect 10p and send it on to the BTBA. Did those responsible for closing Lewisham consult our members when they closed the bowl? Why should we? I can hear you say, I can't think of a better reason than that they had been paying money to participate in the sport they liked enough to put up with the conditions, the same goes for other centres up and down the country. Grotty would be polite in some cases. Yet we still pay to participate and suffer nearly all the time in silence for the fear of loosing what we have got. It's a good job we do not have a few more top class centres around the country so that bowlers could afford to be more choosy where they spend their money.

SEBA is lucky being blessed with seven centres, but we should not be complacent towards others, for there is always room for improvements, that's good management. We all must try harder. More Open Government, better bowling conditions, would be good for a start.

Now I've got that off my chest I can get off my Soap Box.

I suppose I can now expect letters, telephone calls from indignant bowlers from everywhere.

That article on page two of the last issue "Get to know the sport, Tenpin Bowling", was, of course, intended for amusement only and not to be taken seriously. Could it have been anything else?

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
