Bowling in the 2nd squad with one squad to go, Chris & Alan drew the Austrian pair Ernst Berndt and Robert Skach for six games changing lanes after each game. The leader board had been studied, our heros knew what they had to do and were ready. So were the other ace players, they included Mats Karlsson and his partner Tony Resenquist from Sweden, Phillipe Dubois and Patrick Rolland from France, Arne Strome and Erik Garder from Norway, Rich Wonders & Darold Meisel from the USA.

Chris set them alight with an opening game of 276, the 2nd highest game of the doubles, by only 3 pins; but after the 3rd game their score read 1216, respectfully over 200 average but out of touch with their target. The West German pair Peter Panas and Bernd Kornack had scored 1792 after 4 games and only had to hit the same line and the gold medal would be theirs. But it was not to be, the gods looked the other way and they scored 397 -330 to be religated to 4th place at the finish. Meanwhile,

Chris & Alan finished with 429 - 445 for 2515. To be joined soon after by Sullivan & Harding for joint 1st place. The action went in to the next squad, and the last frame when 'ALL' Dutchman Ronald Chanora had to do was SPARE! Chris could not look, Ronald bowled and left the 4-7-9-10, which he failed to spare. J.C. and his team were on hand, and the compettion was off to a brisk start. None of the first squad scores survived to the end of the event. Oh dear, how sad!

Squad 2 saw the arrival of Ciss and Denis Collings. Denis scored 613 and they took the lead in Division 2, but finished 4th at the end of the day.

Sue and Mick Pollard scored 916 in Division 1 for a lead they were not to lose. Trina and Adrian Elliot were 2nd with 903, moved down the order to 5th.

Squad 3 saw Brenda and Vic Field score 903 to share a 5th place in Division 1 at the end of the day. Alan Webster and Marge Lazarus scored 1095, to lead Division 2. Kate and Steve Carnall scored 1084 for 2nd place, Sheila and Gordon Phillips 1037 for 3rd.

Everything has been checked out and, whilst the averages were correct, they were what the American authorities call 'early season averages' which were lower than the end of season averages from last season and were also much lower than the scores put up by both in this tournament and in the Premier Tenpin Bowlers Club events. DEAR SIR.

I have often heard and read of the SEBA. I think I know who or what SEBA is, but with all the initials that often appear in Bowling News and elsewhere it is difficult to know who is who. Would you please explain: BTBA, SEBA, NAYBC, NTBC and the PTBA.

Dear Joe.

It is little wonder you're confused. It will be a pleasure to untie some of the knots.

I shall commence with the British Tenpin Bowling Association (BTBA). The players association responsible for the maintenance of good order within the sport, by providing services necessary for leagues and tournaments to function efficiently. The BTBA conducts the sport at the highest level of competition internationally, whilst at the same time ensuring it does not neglect its duty to us lesser mortals by staging the National Championships, the Inter County Championships, maintains the Awards Programme. The BTBA, on our behalf, is responsible for communications with the International Federation of Tenpin Bowling The Federation Internationale des Quillers (FIQ) - the list is endless. All controlled by the BTBA General Secretary as the Chief Administrator, ably assisted by an Executive Committee, watched over by an elected National Council, ordinary bowlers nominated by Local Associations. That as briefly as possible is the BTBA.

Now on to the Local Association. SEBA, or The South East Bowling Association. A constituent part of the BTBA, and covers the bowling centres in both Kent and Essex. Every Bowler who joins the BTBA through a sanctioned league automatically becomes a SEBA

member.

SEBA is almost a carbon copy of the National Association, has an elected Council, bowlers who act in their spare time as local representatives and link the bowler on the lanes with the Area Council, the Area Secretary, and finally, the General Secretary of the BTBA.

The object of our Local Association throughout the year is to:

(a) Increase the number of members through strengthening leagues, and helping to organise new ones.

(b) Improve and increase services to members.

(c) Help to train officials in the operation of leagues and tournaments, to help with the organisation of Junior bowling in general.

(d) Organise competition at all levels in league and tournament play, and to improve its quality.

(e) To organise and distribute all materials necessary for the efficient operation and sanctioning of leagues with the BTBA in the area. (f) Hold four SEBA Council meetings each year and a SEBA Annual General Meeting for league delegates to participate in the decision making process. Provide delegates each year for the BTBA Annual General Meeting to represent members of the SEBA and to elect National Council Members for Kent and Essex.

(g) Provide a direct means of communication through the Bowling News and give advice and guidance on the rules and regulations of our sport.

(h) Setting up investigation committees when complaints and rule breakages occur, and when League or Tournament fund shortages or losses are reported.

All these services and many others are provided as part of our Local Association Constitution and the funds to provide these services come from a voluntary fee paid each time you bowl in League or Tournaments, 3p per series.

Where does you 3p go? It enables postage to be paid on a variety of letters and parcels including league kits that are sent annually all over the area, and answering the many queries that arise.

YOUR 3p helps to produce the Bowling News magazine distributed free to all our contributing leagues.

YOUR 3p enables SEBA to run its tournaments, including the largest and most successful Area Championships in Great Britain. It helps pay for the entry forms, posters, schedules etc.

YOUR 3p pays for the general

administration costs of the Area Office, the organisation of council meetings and the operation of the Association covering seven centres in two counties, with over 90 sanctioned leagues.

YOUR 3p means that there is an Annual Inter-Centre Championships for all levels of league bowling. It also helps with the registration and support of the two Counties in the National Inter-County Championships. It supports the 600, 550, 500 and 200 Club tournaments which are held every year.

YOUR 3p enables the proper presentation of documents to the BTBA and minutes for the meetings, league information sheets and award forms and so on.

These all go to make the sport one of the best organised in the country. It's like the Fire Brigade — it's there when needed.

How much is collected annually? For the year 1983/84 the SEBA Council budgeted for £2,000, and full account of this will be made known to the delegates at the SEBA AGM this coming February.

Do we have full support from all the leagues around SEBA? We have 100% support from Bexleyheath, Dagenham and Walton on Naze; 60% from Basildon; 95% from Cliftonville; 25% from Whitstable and only 10% from Southend.

Do the non paying members receive the same services? NO, they are excluded from the Club event, do not receive Bowling News, are asked to pay postage and packing on their League Kits, do not receive sponsorship in the Inter-County Championships. They are not invited to participate in the SEBA Masters. They are excluded from High Score recognition on the back page of Bowling News, and would be asked to pay expenses if they required assistance outside the normal services.

NAYBC, National Association of Youth Bowling Clubs. Formerly an independent committee, but now part of the BTBA. A measure of its importance is the fact that the NAYBC Chairman has a seat on the BTBA National Executive Committee.
