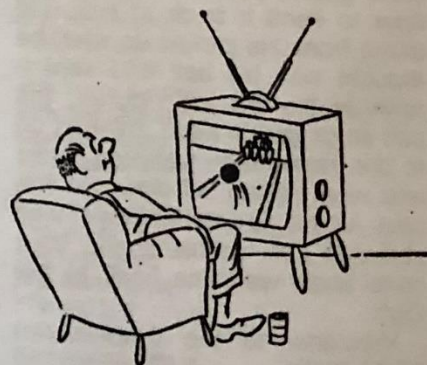
The Kent trials at Bexleyheath attracted 39 men and 19 women. The event was staged over two days Saturday and Sunday 30th/31st March.

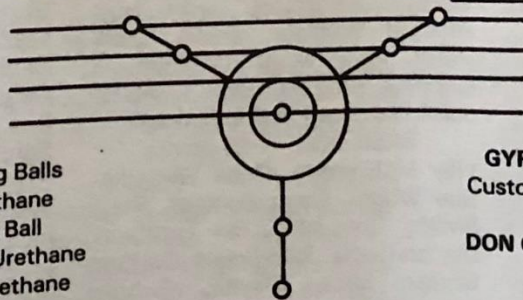

From the B.T.B.A.

All too often players who feel they have a grievance about the BTBA Rules tend to use such expressions as, "This is undemocratic" and "we have our rights" etc. etc.

Apart from the odd barrack room lawyer who is produced as a natural result of our system, the vast majority of people are content to accept what they are told and follow the rules.

At a recent conference of the Central Council of Physical Recreation, a lecture was given by a notable Q.C. on the Principles of Law in relation to Governing Bodies and Discipline Procedure.

To briefly sum up, the clear message given was that Sports Associations are a form of private government and providing they do not break the law of the land, there is little chance that any court would question the rules of the association. In fact, virtually the only time they would be likely to interfere is if the Association were to expel a player and the resulting action could affect that person's livelihood, if they happened to be professionals involved in the industry.

It was made abundantly clear that the BTBA has a legal right to refuse membership to any individual joining for the first time, without stating the reason. You might well feel that this smacks of dictatorship but, what is not generally known is that a vast amount of information is fed back to the hub of the organisation i.e. Head Office, and when believed necessary, this information is checked.

There have been times, for example, when individuals have applied for membership when it has been known that they have convictions for molesting juniors. In such cases the explanation of the reasons for refusal of membership could result in court action by the applicant and, although the person concerned would stand little chance of winning the case, it would nevertheless involve the BTBA in cost and, in particular, time.

In a similar vein, the question of Governing Bodies and Sex Discrimination were discussed and it was

noted that this particular Act of 1975 was designed to cover employment, education and the provision of goods facilities and services to a section of the public.

Section 44 of the act does not, in relation to any sport, game or other activity of a competitive nature where the physical strength, stamina and physique of the average woman puts her at a disadvantage to the average man, render unlawful any act related to the participation of a person as competitor in events involving that activity which are confined to competitors of one sex.

The Sex Discrimination Act does not apply to competitors but would apply to concourse marshalls, scorers and other such employees. So if the girls want an all female league, that is O.K. by the law and, a rule requiring only men to wear shorts does not constitute sexual discrimination.

As many of you know, the BTBA is a Limited Company. Limited Companies are required to have Memorandum and Articles of Association, these being the equivalent to the old constitution.

Articles of Association provide for the Council, consisting of the Executive Officers and, no more than twelve individuals nominated by Local Associations who, at a later stage may be elected to the Council. We say "may be elected" because if more than twelve nominations are received, it is necessary to send particulars of each person concerned to every Association in the country, in order that the Delegates may vote for the twelve they would like to see on the Council. Associations are permitted to submit up to three names, of which one may be accepted.

Having been elected to the Council, the individual concerned DOES NOT represent the County by whom he or she was nominated. There are some thirty-four Local Associations but only twelve elected Council Members. It is therefore obvious that Council Members must cover more than one County.

It should be clearly understood that a Council Member represents the BTBA in a given geographical

area and may be used to reflect the feelings of players in that area.

How are the Articles changed? The Articles of Association may be amended by the Delegates, either at the Annual General Meeting or at an Extraordinary General Meeting called solely for that purpose. The proposals for amendment should be submitted in good time to allow for it's consideration by the Council who, in turn, after it's findings, would make recommendations to the Delegates.

Playing Rules and Regulations are established by the Council of the BTBA (or the Executive Committee which carries out the general work on behalf of the Council) not the delegates. This fact is shown clearly in the articles of Association in that the Council is responsible for the day to day running of the administration and operation of the Organisation.

So, if you have any strong feelings about the rules, please do not think you can have it altered by having it brought up at the AGM. You may certainly approach your National Council Member and express your views initially but, more important, put the facts in writing as, no individual can be expected to remember a lengthy conversation which, often becomes distorted when repeated by a third party.

B.T.B.A. Terms of Reference

Relating to Representative Teams

1. The National Council decided that teams representing Gt. Britain **MUST** be selected by Phase III Coaches who will place emphasis on compatibility as well as ability in team events.
2. Under no circumstances may individuals represent Gt. Britain as a result of winning tournaments, through merit tables, or such similar method.
3. The Chairman of the British Tenpin Bowling Instructors Association is authorised to nominate one, or more, suitable persons who will be responsible for selecting a squad of 12 boys and 12 girls, also 12 each of the Young Adults.
4. The names of all players involved **MUST** be sent to Head Office for approval **BEFORE** they are invited to the squad.
5. Once named in the squad, any 6 of the 12 may be used at any time as representative teams, without reference to Head Office.
6. With the co-operation of the Chairman of the BTBIA, training sessions should be set up for the players in the squad.
7. The selectors may, at their will, drop any player and replace them if the required ability appears to drop below the standard set by Coaches.
8. In view of the possibility of frequent changes taking place, especially in the Junior Section, it is not advisable to have made-to-measure clothing. Uniforms should be held by a responsible person to re-issue to the players.
9. Under no circumstances should the words 'Gt. Britain' appear on the back of any shirt, in anything other than official international tournaments such as the European Youth Championships, and any other international event when authority has been granted by Head Office for the use of such insignia. In all other cases, the only letters to appear on the reverse side of shirts should be BTBA and the Union Jack
10. It should be borne in mind that, in the international field, other countries and organisations do not understand NAYBC or YAC, but they do understand, BTBA.
11. All sub-committees and organisations of the BTBA **MUST** include these letters in badges and publicity material.
12. Blazer badges **must** also contain the letters, BTBA likewise stickers etc.
13. All designs **MUST** be submitted to Head Office for approval before use.

SEBA Junior Championships 1984
Bexleyheath 1st December

71 Junior Bowlers from 4 Centres in the SEBA Area came to Bexleyheath Bowl on Saturday 1st December 1984 to compete in the revived SEBA Junior Championships.
