Seba Travelling League Tour of U.S.A.

At the end of July, 172 people, the majority of whom were regular Bowlers, assembled at Gatwick Airport to start a memorable Tour to Connecticut in the U.S.A.

The original idea was conceived by the organiser, Chas Dummett, and the ultimate success of the Tour was the result of both his efforts and those of our hosts in America, 'Bowlmaster' and the Connecticut Bowling Proprietors Association.

On the first day, we all had the opportunity of buying bowling equiment at Bowlmaster' from an extremely wide range, with practical help on hand at local lanes from four professional bowlers, Don Johnson, Mark Roth, Joe Beradi and Dick Weber. We are sure that our hosts were overwhelmed by the quantity of purchases, which : were encouraged by the extremely low prices with which we were confronted. We shall not make the readers mouth water any further. Every member of the party was presented with a Bowling Shirt, which will now be seen on many future occasions in British Bowls (it is easy to recognise and has the word 'travelling' spelt the American way with only one 1').

In the evening, we were entertained by our hosts at an excellent Welcoming Banquet. Following the playing of the National Anthems, messages of greeting were read out from the White House, the Governor of Connecticut, William O'Neil and U.S. Senator, Christopher Dodd. Speeches of welcome were then made by our hosts, Bob Maulucci, the Present of Bowlmaster', Vic Puia, the President, Ken West the Executive Director and Bill DeDominicis, the Secretary/ Treasurer, all of the Connecticut Bowling Proprietors Association.

During the first weekend, the whole party were invited to participate in the Singles event organised by the National Independent Tour (N.I.T.) at Simsbury Lanes, which are owned and operated by the Puia family. In the USA, it is normal for Leagues to run during the Winter season only, with Tournaments allocated to the Summer months. The N.I.T. is restricted

to regular Bowlers having an average of 190 and below. This made it very easy to accommodate our party for a Tournament where the prize money had been specifically increased with a first prize of \$1200.00.

On a handicap system, four games were bowled, the field cut to 33 on the second day for a further four games and then to the leading five for a step-ladder final.

From a total entry of 292, our hosts were surprised to find the SEBA bowlers giving a good account of themselves — maybe it was the money on the table. When it came to the first cut, 18 out of 33 were from our party and as we came to the step ladder, we were delighted to find 4 out of 5 competing for the first prize.

As often happens in step-ladder finals, the nerves began to take over, but there was plenty to cheer for all the Brits watching as the lone American, Chuck Norris, was beaten into fourth place. In the all British final, Dave Lehrian from Southend/Dagenham beat young Phil Clarke from the Midlands with Matt Rayner finishing third and Brian Greene fifth.

On a personal note, it should be recorded for posterity that your Editor finished in 44th place and picked up \$23.00 in prize money, not surprisingly his first ever prize from the sport.

The celebrations of Dave's success went on well into the night, and the word soon spread around Connecticut that the 'Brits' were no pushover.

On the second weekend we were back at Simsbury Lanes for a Doubles Tournament again run by the N.I.T. for another first prize of \$1200.00

This time, the Tournament was a straightforward competi-

tion over two games only, with handicap. Being a re-entry Tournament, there were many Anglo-American pairings, but the Americans were very determined that the first prize should remain in Connecticut, which it did, the winners being Roger Wolcott and Teddy Raymundo. Irene Dummett finished second with an American partner, Bill Cheetham, with the first English pairing, Barry Emberson and Roy Ashenden in fourth place. During the Tournament, Roy bowled a personal high game of 275, was presented with a special plaque at the last night Banquet and from latest reports is still celebrating. Prize money was paid down to 50th place and in number of bowlers was split 50/50 between the English and

American participants.
On most evenings, matches were arranged at various Centres throughout Connecticut and Southern Massachucetts. The party was divided into three sections with a coachload going to one of three Centres on each of nine evenings. With little duplication, over 20 different Bowls were visited, most of which had at least 40 lanes on one level.

On Coach No. 3, we kept detailed statistics of all the matches. Four Games were bowled each evening by 40 Bowlers on each side with handicap, the handicap for the English bowlers being taken from their leagues in the U.K.

Over the nine evenings a total of 50 Bowlers were used, including two youngsters drafted in when the pace began to take its toll near the end of the Tour. Of these 50 Bowlers, 32 ended up bowling above their entering average and only 18 below average. The pattern was very clear in that each evening we were losing the first game to the Americans, but as we became used to the local conditions, the scores improved and most evenings, we ran out easy winners.

Bearing in mind that the local Bowlers do not have league bowling in the summer months,

the lane conditions were very consistent at nearly all the Centres and the English were bowling almost every night, it was almost inevitable that we should be recording higher than average scores. Mind you, there were factors acting against good scoring. Many were bowling with brand new Balls, but professionals were on hand to make minor adjustments at all Centres and our hosts soon discovered that many were partial to Budweiser draught beer, and mysteriously glasses were constantly being topped up throughout the evening on all lanes.

Special mention should be made of Malcolm Collier from Hemel Hempstead who averaged 180.1 over 36 games (entering average 167) to take many of the evening 'pots' and to Anita Ashenden from Dagenham, who originally was not planning to bowl on this Tour. Anita stepped into the breach to bowl on two evenings to beat her average by 16 pins, which is certainly more than her husband achieved. Meanwhile, their son, Daniel, approaching his fourth birthday, was introduced to the Sport and thoroughly enjoyed the experience particularly on the lanes provided with bumpers (inflatable cushions placed in the gutters to allow the ball to bounce back into the pins).

On the last evening, we were able to organise a return Banquet to thank our hosts, and speeches from Alison Teasdale representing the North-East contingent, Trevor Birch for the Southern Counties, Jerry Lodge for Kent and Brian Molineaux for Essex attempted to express the feelings of the whole Group but we were all put in the shade by the concluding speech from Vic Puia, who very amusingly demonstrated his grasp of the subtleties of the English' language.

It would be wrong to say that there were no problems regarding the organisation of this Tour, but when considering the task of moving 172 poeple around an area equivalent to the size of England for a period of 16 days without someone becoming upset is an impossibility. However, the majority of people on the Tour will have returned to their homes with many happy memories and experiences which can only whet their appetites to return to a most hospitable area of the United States where the Brits' were made so welcome.
