MG: That's right. Great Britain had to put the proposal in to make sure that in the future these proxies would be handled properly.

Sounds like you have to play a political game to get your point across?

GZ: Yes, that's right. Unfortunately, that is the way it is today. But I guess you'd find that in almost any organisation.

Bowling's new Olympic status is a subject of intense pride. Should we be concerned about bowling's situation as we head into the Games?

GZ: Of course, we should be concerned. We worry about getting so much financial support from the industry, but FIQ itself just can't raise enough funds.

Many of our federations have money problems. Bowlers from New Zealand and Argentina, for example, had to pay their own expenses to get here. Some of them had to sell their cars to finance their trips. For them, it's a once in a lifetime dream to bowl in the FIQ. They might not stand a chance, but they know they're taking part in history. Same thing with the Olympics.

MG: You mention having to rely on the industry, the commercial side, for money. What money is it that we

are talking about?

GZ: Well, you know, Maurice, we are not getting a freebie into the Olympics. Someone has to put some money into it. And when I say some money, we're talking a lot of money. We could never have been accepted even as a demonstration sport without the support of the industry. MG: That's a good point. We struggled for many, many years, and we finally got a little recognition (preliminary IOC recognition) in 1979. If Frank Baker were asked, an honest answer would be that the total cost of that major step of getting a little recognition was half a bottle of whisky. It was not \$1.8 million, or \$5 million or anything else, it was simply a question of knowing the right people and being there at the right time.

I'm sure you've both had many chances to debate the directions you want FIQ to go. Where's your strongest area of disagreement?

MG: Gosta and I disagree on several aspects of the European Zone. In 1965 in Stockholm, I was the idiot

who proposed that the world should be split into three zones. As a result of that, they made me the first president of the European Zone. I served six years, and when we finished, we had £4,000 in the bank, we had an awards programme, we had a licensing programme to raise money to run the Zone, we had a certification programme

And then, in 1975, I was promoted to president of the Tenpin Division. The man who succeeded me decided that issuing licenses was too much work, so we stopped. Naturally, the income stopped, too, and he decided we had to get money from another source. That's when we started increasing the dues for the national federations. It's gradually closing up to \$2,000 a year for the privilege of bowling in the Zone.

GZ: It's actually \$1,300.

MG: Has it gone down this year? I know it's over £1,000.

GZ: It's over 2,000 Swiss francs, I believe.

MG: Maybe. But we recently sent a cheque for over £2,000 for two years. That's nearly \$1,700 a year out of our poor little income to go to the Zone.

You're the European Zone president now, Gosta. How are you handling the situation?

GZ: Well, the dues increase was decided before I was elected, I haven't raised dues one cent since I was elected in 1981.

I'm trying to make it cheaper, if possible. And I also cut the individual entry fees at the European Cup from \$100 to \$50. So I don't feel guilty.

Maurice, what else worries you about FIQ?

MG: I saw a story in the WBW Worldletter that the industry of the United States was going to give \$100,000 a year to FIQ.

GZ: That's correct. That was over a period of three years to cover the cost of the salary and travel expenses of a full-time General Secretary. On the other hand, we also were told that the three zones would eventually have to fund the secretary's office. My response, as president of the European Zone, was that I wasn't going to raise our zone dues to cover that kind of expense. That's up to the president of the FIQ to find a way to do that.

MG: Gosta, I'm delighted to hear

you say that because this is the first time that anybody has been honest enough to say that this is what took place and that it's not just rumour. The thing that frightens me more than anything else is that there is no trace anywhere of the \$100,000 a year on the balance sheet of FIQ. When I look at the balance sheet for Mr. Sarahete's salary - which I heard quoted through 16 different parties as being \$48,000 a year for three years with a retirement pension guaranteed after that - and can't find it, am I being over suspicious? GZ: A question about the \$100,000 was asked at the conference. The answer was that his salary doesn't come from FIQ, it comes from another account that has nothing to do with FIO.

Evidently, you guys do agree in some areas, though?

MG: Well, I think Gosta would agree with me on one thing - that we should take an example from the softball association, which sanctions every softball which is produced in the United States. When I was in office (European Zone president), I approached industry leaders to get their reaction to putting a decal on every bowling pin to say that this pin was approved by FIQ. And they said, We'd be more than happy to give you 25 cents on every bowling pin that's sold that carries the FIQ stamp.' Now here is a way of generating enough money for FIQ to be totally independent of the commercial side.

I understand you're thinking about departing the bowling wars, Maurice.

MG: I am due for retirement before the next Congress.

Any final thoughts concerning the FIQ, its past, present or future?

MG: As far as the future is concerned, it's still an ambition of mine to see the control of the sport in the hands of the international governing body. It's as simple as that. As far as the past is concerned, it's been a fantastic experience. I've travelled over a million miles for bowling. I went to Australia for a weekend once to sort out a problem.


Recently, a writer summed it up beautifully when she said it sounded as though this was a love affair that lasted longer than many marriages. How about you, Gosta?

GZ: Yes, I fully agree. If you weren't nuts about bowling, you couldn't spend so many hours on this. Since I was elected European Zone president, I've spent nearly 30 hours a week on FIQ business. You have to love it. And even your family has to love it because it takes a tremendous amount of time. That's really the problem. A lot of people want to be elected FIQ officers, but they don't spend half an hour a year on business.

We need more people with experience and power who are really willing to work for bowling. I see the FIQ's sun coming up bright because we have 73 members. As soon as Africa comes into membership — and they have bowling facilities throughout Africa — we will be within reach of 100 nations. And that's really something. We are very proud of our organisation, both of us. We've grown up with FIQ since 1952, so we are a part of it.
