Kent Ladies win Silver

ONCE AGAIN we are motoring up the M1 to the Inter-County Finals—this year to Strykers at Wolver-hampton— and once again both our ladies' and men's teams have qualified at the top of their group, the men as defending champions.

This year there are two extra teams in each section from Scotland, making ten teams. The tournament is run as a round robin, each team playing the others once with two points for a win ending with a position round. The team with the highest number of points are the champions (if the points are level then pinfall is taken into account).

When the tournament started it became obvious that the lane conditions were difficult and the only people who had a consistent shot were lefties. The men's team found it difficult to win games with the opposition psyching themselves up to beat the champions.

This year it was the turn of the ladies. Their first game was against Co Durham — one of the favourites with Yorkshire — and although bowling well, were just beaten. They gained their first win against Dorset in the next game, they also gained points against Fife and Aberdeen but lost to Hampshire.

While everyone was watching the progress of the 'big two' Sussex had been piling up the points and finished the day leading with 10 points with Yorks on 8, Durham on 8, Staffs on 8 and Kent on 6.

The ladies had time to relax and let their hair down in the evening at the Dinner Dance (luckily the

win over Staffordshire followed by Kent's high game of 929 to beat the leaders Sussex. The next game was against Yorkshire (quite a formidable line-up on paper) but not to be overawed by reputations we beat them by 70 pins with another 900 plus game. The ninth game was against the bottom team, Warwickshire. We seemed to have some reaction to our good start and bowled the low game of our series and lost.

The last game was the position round. Sussex v Co Durham, Yorks v Kent for the medals. If we beat Yorks we knew we had a medal, what colour was dependent upon the top match, if Durham were to win it would be bronze, but if Sussex won it would be silver. That's how it worked out. All the team bowled with determination and good humour and thoroughly deserved their success.

Kevin Raison wins Skol U.K. Tenpin Classic

Over 300 bowlers from all over the U.K., Europe and even the USA gathered at the Airport Bowl over the August Bank Holiday weekend to contest the first Skol U.K. Classic Singles tournament with its first prize of £5000 the largest prize ever given to bowling in this country.

There were three days of intense qualification by all competitors, while the temperature outside the bowl was in the 80's the score inside were very high which included a 300 game by Sweden's Mats Karlsson in his qualifying victory over Michael Ross 792 to 720.

Karlsson, who was the pre tournament favourite, was not to reach the finals in this double ko format tournament, two defeats and you are out, he was to be defeated by Margate's Cliff Dew.

Cliff was not destined to reach the final stages, he was to be defeated by Bexleyheath's Kevin Raison 202 to 231. Kevin then lost in the final qualifying round to Chris Buck 234 to 214, so dropping him into the losers section. Kevin who had the lowest average of the 40 bowlers who qualified for the final stages, fought his way through by some fine bolwing.

In the televised single game stepladder finals, Trevor Wood defeated Chuck Carrol from the USA 252 to 196 so putting Chuck into 5th place. In the next match Trevor was to be beaten by Dave Huxtable 226 to 144, so it was Trevor who was to be 4th. The third televised match saw Kevin Raison and Dave Huxtable in a very tight match with Kevin finishing with 3 strikes in the 10th frame to take the match by just 9 pins, 209 to 200, so relegating Dave to 3rd place.

The Championship game between Kevin Raison and Chris Buck was a tense affair but the better start by Kevin was to make him the Skol U.K. Single Champion and £5000 richer by defeating Chris 216 to 182.

Council Meet

A full meeting of the KTBA Council took place on Sunday 6th October. Apologies for non attendance had been received from the remainder of the council members.

The President sought and received the approval of council for his appointment to the KTBA Council of George Savage and Gary Pring, these Presidential appointments would only be until our next Annual General Meeting when they must seek election in the normal way.

Editorial

At the recent meeting of the KTBA Council much time was taken up discussing the raising of funds to run our Area Association. All moneys raised by KTBA must be by fund raising events such as raffles, sale of stickers etc. or via our voluntary 5p scheme.

KTBA along with all other Area Associations receive no financial assistance from the BTBA, the Proprietors or any other body.

When I first started bowling in 1964 the annual BTBA membership fee was £1.00 (that must be equivalent to £15.00 today). Of that £1.00, 10/- (sorry 50p) was returned to fund the Area Association. This scheme was replaced with today's membership arrangement by the BTBA in the early 1970's, for what I reason I do not know, but I am sure that the BTBA considered they were doing the right thing for our sport.

In the USA, if I can believe what I read in Bowlers Journal, the American Bowling Congress still pass on to their Area Associations part of the bowlers' annual membership fee.

With the new upsurge in bowling, more centres being opened, therefore more leagues for Area Associations to look after, the new understanding with the Proprietors and the BTBA working hand in hand for the mutual benefit of our sport, is it not time that the BTBA looked for some scheme that would fund efficient Area Associations or allow them to levy membership fees but the BTBA maintaining the right to withdraw that privilege should be Areas Association's efficiency of service not meet the set standards.

While our Area Association's officers, who work unpaid for our sport during their spare time, have to spend that time raising funds to allow our Area Association to operate, they cannot give a full and efficient service to our members.

I believe that it is time that the finances of Area Associations were put on a firm basis to allow the officers to work for the mutual benefit of our sport, the BTBA and the Proprietors without having to worry where the money is coming from to allow them to do their duty.

World Tenpin Bowling Association

At the recent FIQ World Congress held in Singapore during the recent World Championships, the Tenpin Division of the Federation International des Quilleurs will now be known as the World Tenpin Bowling Association.

Previously, all dues from member associations went to the FIQ organisation in Finland who then doled it out as needed to both the tenpin and ninepin divisions. This had not given the tenpin division enough income to fund their desired bowling programme and had to rely on subsidies from the Bowling Industry, the IOC and the American Bowling Congress.

The new dues programme is based on the total bowler membership of each of the 79 member Nations and is expected to bring in some \$40,000. This will be used to finance changes master-minded by the WTBA President Dr. Nathan and his Council which include a programme to improve tenpin bowling's Olympic prospects.

Other major changes included, adoption of most of the abc/wibc "System of Bowling" equipment specification, to train and certify Official Coaches, run drug tests at world and zone tournaments and to establish a ranking system for bowlers based on performance at tournaments.

It is claimed that these measures will improve bowling's changes for full status in the Olympic Games.

Coast to Coast Tournament

Top Ten Bowl Cliftonville staged its first "Coast to Coast" scratch and handicap Doubles Tenpin Bowling Tournament over two weekends in October. 78 participating teams came from most of the Southern Counties, London and some from Birmingham.

The first days play had local brother and sister team, Barbara Edicott and Dave Goodall, (Skin and Blister) in 1st place in both scratch and handicap divisions with 1068 and 1275 pins.

Day two was a much more keenly contested affair with visiting teams coming to the fore. Husband and wife team, Steve and Sheila White, (SNAFU 1) from Bexleyheath leapt to the top of the scratch division with 1138 pins, not to be outdone fellow bowlers from Bexleyheath, George and Christine Savage. (Hedgehogs) turned in 1286 to lead the handicap section.

So far 19 games of over 200 had been rolled with Dave Goodall and Gary Steventon leading, both with games of 222. Day three had some good bowling but no performances to catch the leaders.

The final day had all squads full and 50 teams ready to battle it out for top honours. Squad 1 and still no team catching SNAFU 1 in the scratch section, Graeme Hearne and Steve Hargreaves (Oddballs) from Beckton Bowl turned in a 1293

pin total to take over the handicap division lead.

In Squad 2 no teams could catch the leaders and the positions remained unchanged. Squad 3 saw the action hotting up with Bernie Caterer and Dave Buck (Old Stagers) a Finsbury Park/Cliftonville pairing taking the lead in the scratch with 1187 pins only to be passed by Dave Fannon and Willie Williams (Lewisham Live Wires IV) with 1193 and 1313 which gave them the lead with both divisions. Some fine bowling in this squad with 11 games over 200 and Bernie a 624 series and Dave a 642 series. Squad 4 had most teams doing well but not making any impressions on the leaders.

Squad 5 and the last, all to play for and nothing to lose. Local brothers team of Any and Mal Aller. ton (Alleycats) turned in a 1165 total scratch to end up third behind Old Stages 1187 and 2nd and Lewisham Live Wires IV 1193 and first place in the scratch section. Oddballs 1293 was enough to clinch them 3rd place in the handicap section with Lewisham Live Wires IV 1313 in 2nd. Honours went to Alleycats with Andy's 256 game and 673 series ably supported by Mal giving the team a total of 1327 pins and 1st place in the handicap section. A splendid tournament played in line with B.T.B.A. ideals, in good fellowship and true sportsmanship

Cliftonville's High Average Tournament

The annual High Average Invitational Tournament at the Top Ten Bowl Cliftonville as usual provided a demonstration of fine bowling.

The tournament is competed for by 12 of the highest average bowlers at the centre over the previous 12 months, the lowest competing average this year was 174.94. All the bowlers have to play six games over 12 lanes thereby demonstrating their skill at recognising the slight variation needed to bowl good games, the highest pinfall over the six games is the winner.

In the first game Dave Buck roll-

ed a 208 to take an early lead, the second game had Paul Crundell bowling a 235 (426) only to be eclipsed by Jill Baldwin, the only lady bowler qualifier, who turned in a 233 (427). The third game had Jill 189 (616) and Paul 193 (619) really scrapping it out with Dave not far behind on 176 (575).

Game four had Dave renewing his challenge with a 202 (777), Paul 170 (789) and Jill 189 (805) the new leader. Game five and Dave's 180 (957) still saw him in 3rd place, Paul 175 (964) had him in 2nd place, Jill

meanwhile was not waiting for anybody and rolled in a 215 and 1020 total to stretch her lead.

The last game and Dave's 170 (1127) was enough to confirm him in 3rd place despite a challenge by Matt Slade who rolled a 611 over the last three games. Jill's 158 (1178) was only good enough for 2nd place because Paul had saved a big one for the end, a 222 (1186) was enough to pip Jill by 8 pins and confirm him as this year's champion. Paul had rolled just under a 198 average and Jill just over a 197.
