BOWLING TO GET OLYMPIC "PRESENCE" AT BARCELONA GAMES!

Bowling will be in the Barcelona Olympics - sort of.

According to an announcement made at the midwinter meeting of the Bowling Proprietors' Association of America board of directors, Brunswick will install 16 lanes in the Olympic Village in Barcelona, for the use of the 15,000 athletes from 90 countries who will complete in the '92 Summer Games. Don Hillman, chairman of BPPA's Olympic committee, said tenpin leaders hope to stage some kind of exhibition, though there are no plans for any formal competition.

The site, a brand new recreation building in the centre of the Olympic complex, fronts the Mediterranean. The lanes will be installed just prior to the Games and removed upon the conclusion of a special competition for handicap athletes following the Games.

Brunswick will spend an estimated \$1 million on equipment for the project, while other industry components (BPAA, ABC, WIBC and the Japanese BPA) chip in about \$750,000 in operating expenses.

After making its first official Olympic appearance as an exhibition sport in 1988 at Seoul, the sport's bid for venue status at the '92 games was rejected by the International Olympic Committee and the Barcelona Organising Committee (COOB).

Undeterred, bowling leaders pressed on. It was agreed that some kind of presence in Spain was necessary if powling were to keep its Olympic monentum going.

"We needed a presence in Spain" explained Don Hillman. "The industry can't afford to send its leaders all over the world to plead bowling's cause.

"We think our bowling centre at the Games... is a great opportunity to show off our sport in its best light to the entire Olympic community. If we present ourselves well, it could enhance our chances for Atlanta"

Free bowling lineage will be included in the pass issued to every Olympic athlete. Bowling leaders also hope to stage a series of parties and exhibitions to show off the sport and its top perform-
