Some towns are colourful. They inspire and encourage the human mind to be imaginative in the way it thinks. Nottingham is not one of these towns. Las Vagas is, but Nottingham isn't. I was in Nottingham.

The Nottinghamshire County Council had introduced a one way system into their main town, a good idea. But judging by some of the actions of the locals, they either had not come to terms with this complicated system, or had just never heard of it. As a result, what we thought was going to be a relaxing twenty minutes journey through this old boring town turned out to be a hectic one hour equivalent.

The bowl looks, from the outside, like a 12 lane centre not a 48 lane giant. But once you get inside you are overwhelmed by the amount of space the bowl had. We sat on the coach visually examining the dirty but prominent signs the bowl possessed, namely "Bowl" and "Food", while Ron the coach driver went and enquired as to if the bowl owned any space for coaches to park. Apparently the bowl shared the neighbouring Ice Rink's facilities. As we filed off the coach, an air of excitement could be detected in our general chat.

Entering the bowl was a moment to remember, and talking to Paul Salter and Carl Barr after the tournament, it was the same phenomena for them too. The atmosphere, present along all 24 lanes of the lower level was incredible, even more so for an unknown, under grown eleven year old. What I came to realise was that I was not alone in this feeling. Even now memories flash before me of this moment: Jerry Lodge asking for BTBA cards and dishing out squad times and lane numbers; Auntie Kaye bringing up the rear of the party accompanied by an enormous holdall full of shirts (later it became twice as heavy due to sweat), and the illustrious Neil Webb, only been there five minutes, but already hamburger laden, and yelling encouragement in that easily recognisable tone.

After giving Jerry my card, I obtained a shirt from the overrun Kaye and made my way through the crowds to the leader board. When you see appellations like Paul Delany, Daniel Evans and Stwart Miller dominating your division (under 13) in each event, hitting 550's without breaking into too much of a sweat, it

make you wonder if these people are really human.

My lane, No. 1, was clear, so I went down to it and begun my pre bowl warm up routine; put shoes on, buff ball vigorously, exercise fingers, neck and legs. To be really honest, I did not have much of a chance in any event (singles, doubles, team, all events), bowling off of a 108 average, but I looked on it philosophically as valuable experience. The handshake with my Glenrothes YBC opponents and my doubles partner, Paul Salter not only signified the start of the doubles event, but also the start of my first major tournament.

As the computer switched us to match play, I could still hear Neil Webb's dulcet tones up on lane 48, about 5 minutes walk from where I was! Considering my average, hitting 118, 135, 146 for a 399 was a good encouraging start, even more so for my good natured companion and room mate, Paul Slater, who threw his first ever 400 series, a 402, as we amassed 801 for the doubles.

Time to grab a quick coke and some helpful advice from Dad before lugging may 12lb Columbia 300 down to lane 14 for the singles. 119, 122, 154 gave me 395, and sinking my teeth into a cheeseburger while listening to some encouraging praise from Dad, I felt as if I had achieved something.

I then looked forward to exploring our hotel that evening.

In the other Semi Final Rosemary Bentley met Simon Young. Simon bowling with 14 handicap against Rosemarys 21.

In the opening series Simon could only manage a 424 against Rosemarys 471. In fairness to Simon it has to be said that he was recovering from a painful rib injury, but he stuck manfully to his task and his next series totalled 495 to which Rosemary replied with a 435. With handicap adjustments Rosemary emerged winner by 27 pins.

This set up the Final between Gary and Rosemary and after 30 minutes rest battle commenced.

Gary continued his over whelming form of the previous round and turned in games of 191, 177, 198 for a 566 series to Rosemarys 171, 167, 139 and a 477 series.

In the second and final series Rosemary showed plenty of grit, and rolled a 560 series to Garys 570 to push him all the way but failed by just 21 pins to catch him. In the Roll Off for 3rd and 4th places Sally Fuller beat Simon Young by 174 nins





They coasted to an easy win over the Musketeers with all three players putting together 500 plus series to leave the result never in doubt. Top spot however is held by X-Men, John Smith who followed last weeks 613 with a 602, and Darryl Oldfield. Two points behind are Blankety Blank who in turn have a 15 point lead over Double Chance for whom Tony Baker rolled a very nice 596.

Cobras and Punkah Wallahs both hit games of 400 plus but were way behind Blankety Blank whose second game was 419. Double Chance, Punkah Wallahs and X-Men all secured just over two points bonus in the scratch series section.

Week 3

Leading Light this week was Sally Fuller who rolled a 626 series for Double Top and was well supported by Partner Martin Howard with a 567 series. Their 3 point win plus nearly 4 points bonus lifted them to third place in the table behind Blankety Blank who scored just over three and a half points and the X-Men, who despite loosing the first two games bowled well enough to muster just under three and a half points. Punkah Wallahs kept up their challenge in 4th place with a solid four and a half points thanks to a 597 series from Kevin Miles. Fourth of July, a very independent team, scored well to pocket just over 5 points and dark horses Dodo's also managed 5 points.

Week 4

High Spot of this weeks fixtures was the 637 series for Roland Foxley bowling for his team "Rollocks". He was followed by Don Cook who did his Houdini act by rolling a 605 series with a 134 first game.

Another bowler who has really found a line is Bob Gentry who whilst bowling for the Dodos now has a personal best average of 173.
