THE MEN OF KENT AWAY TO A GOOD START

The first qualifying round, of this years Inter County Championships, was held at Solar Bowl, Ipswich on the first Sunday in June.

The usual format applied where each of the eight Counties in the Group bowled a single five person team scratch game against each of the other counties, with the scores carrying forward to the second qualifying round to be held against the same counties at Lloyds Lanes, Raynes Park in September.

The top two Counties from each section then progress through to the National Finals. In the event of a tie on points, the Team with the higher pinfall will be the winner.

On a very warm day, all teams found the conditions very difficult and the scoring was low throughout the day. The Kentish Men, undercaptain Steve Carnall, started off with a win against Hertfordshire by 778 to 733, and then lost to Sussex 888 to 990, despite a 244 game from anchor bowler John Amos. The last game before lunch and lane dressing break produced a close win against old rivals Essex by 858 to 832.

In the afternoon, the bowling was very tense with three close games starting with wins against Suffolk 877/851 and Surrey 833/826 followed by the most thrilling game of the day ending in a tied match with Middlesex, each scoring 967. In this game the Middlesex anchor, Chris Buck, needed a strike in the twelfth frame to clinch victory and took out nine pins, one of which took a long time to fall. In other words a typical Counties game putting great pressure on anchor bowlers. Throughout the day, John Amos was the Kent anchor with a 192 average.

The last game was a comprehensive win over London 1021 to 765 with 200 games from Mike Luckhurst, Steve Carnall, John Amos and Richard Post.

This has left Kent in a very strong position for the second round, particularly as there is a three point cushion over the teams in third and fourth positions. However there is a lot more bowling to be done. The Kent team for this round was John Amos (average on the day of 192), Richard Post (186) Steve Carnall (185) Steve White (178), Mike Luckhurst, John Hinch and Clive Mitchell.

In the ladies match, under the same format against the same Counties, Kent started off with a win against Suffolk, thanks to a good finish by seventeen year old Lucy Cudmore, representing Kent for the first time at senior level. The score 824 to 784.

The whole team struggled against the conditions and lost their next match against London 771 to 835 and then came back with a good win over Middlesex 859 to 820 with a high game of 212 from Elaine Hinch.

After the break the ladies came up against Essex on form losing to them by 826 to 935 and then in their closest match of the day narrowly lost to Surrey by 785 to 790. Despite a 210 game from the Kent captain, Sheila White, the ladies were comprehensively beaten by Sussex 770 to 864 but Kent kept themselves in with an outside chance of qualifying for the finals by beating Hertfordshire 864 to 680 with Elaine Hinch rolling a 201 and Lesley Pope 200

Drinking hot coffee at 6.30am in the Bexleyheath Superbowl Car Park on the 6th February was not a very wise start to the day. Having just six hours sleep the previous night due to a pantomime did not make the morning any better. The rest of the squad filtered in and swelled our good natured crowd to 20.

We eventually boarded our newly arrived mustard coloured coach. Our first thought was sleep, our second thought, food.

The main events of the smooth 4 hour journey though were the superb adventure playground where we stopped for breakfast, at Hinckley, and the on-board toilet, which was quite primitive, but the topic of much discussion during the day.

After much consternation, Acocks Green Bowl was found, and the directions given by Neil Webb proved invaluable.

Armed with squad leader Tony Patey's team talk, we strolled in through the swing doors, and were immediately hit with the enormity of the scores. 601 three game set for the senior boys singles gold?!

A lot of us had been wondering if it had been worth turning up. But after the usual pre bowl routine, register, change shirts, obtain lane number, all 20 of us were on the lanes ready to do battle in the doubles.

Excellent opening sets were achieved by Grant Machin 545, Mike Foord 511 (208 game) and his partner Daniel Patey with 528. Simon Dormer hit form with games of 178 and 176 but Danny Manchester annihilated his personal best game with a third game 209. This improved Danny's series as his second game totalled a huge 91.

A break followed, which allowed us to reflect on the competition thus far, and also to consume much needed nourishment.

We were split up for the next event, 8 of

us bowling at 12.00, the other 12 at 1.00pm. 12 noon came quickly, but before 1.00pm dawned on us, two of our younger bowlers climbed their way into the top ten of their division. Nine year old Nick Weston shot 126, 145, 136 for a 407 and 10 year old James Pateman threw a 209 game in an excellent 506 set. These scores were achieved with the valuable support from the Bexleyheath instructors.

Not to be outdone, bowlers in the 1.00pm squad performed admirably. Mike Foord's 202 game, Daniel Patey's 202, 557 and Grant Machin's 191 for example.

One memorable incident in this squad was when Paul Dunbar, kepling well, sauntered up to Sharon Patey, Bexleyheath YBC's score keeper, and informed her of his 140 game. After being congratulated by various instructors, Paul was called for, it was his go. It now dawned on us that Paul's so called 140 game consisted of only eight frames, but Paul, a bowler of 4 years experience, thought that he had finished with 140. Paul officially finished up with a 178 ten frame total.

Many tired bowlers contested the team event, but despite this our competitors kept up the flow of quality games. Lefties Matt Marshall and Julie Cudmore turned in 185 and 160 games respectively. Dave Mills featured with a 493 series and Lee Benham threw 165 and 180. Daniel Patey threw a personal best 580 series which included 212 and 200 games and amassed 1665 for 9 games, a 185 average, but due to the extremely high standard, this did not make the All Events top three.

One score which did though was Nick Weston's 1089 for nine games. Nick was rewarded with Bexleyheath's only medal, a bronze.

This tournament is one of the biggest in Britain, and we thank our instructors for organising and supporting us so well and for joining in with the extremely loud and out of tune singing which dominated our safe journey home.

PAULINE SMITH WINS 1993 EUROPEAN CUP

Reigning British Open Champion, Pauline Smith, defeated defending champion Anne Nystrom of Sweden in

the title match, 404 - 338, to add the 1993 FIQ European Individual Cup to her ever growing roster of international titles. Pauline earned the right to meet the qualifying leader by demolishing another Swede, Margateta Paulson, in the semi final match, 276 - 200.

In the men's action, a portly Greek pro shop operator, Kostas Sakellariou, stunned 1991 FIQ Masters champion Mika Koivuniemi of Finland and Goran Carlsson of Sweden to win the gold medal. Sakellariou tripped third seeded Koivuniemi 212 - 196, before subduing Carlsson 447 - 411, to win Greece's first gold medal in a non handicap international competition. For Britain, Geoff Buck finished in a creditable seventh place.

The European Cup was held at the 22 lane Superbowl, located on the outskirts of Tel Aviv. It marked the first time any international bowling event had been held in Israel and was deemed a great success by competitors and federation officials that attended. The 1994 European Cup will take place at the 32 lane Plus Bowling in Vienna, Austria, between 7th and 10th April.

THE SHANGHAI

IMAGINE PALACE

The Shanghai Imagine Palace, which opened in April, is the second largest of China's 77 bowling centres. The 24 lane establishment is eclipsed only by the Beijing Recreation Centre, a 26 lane centre, which was completed in 1989. The new centre, the first in China to be equipped with Brunswick's AS-90 automatic scorers, will occupy the top floor of a free standing, four story building. The rest of the building will be occupied by a health club, a ballroom, a videogame centre and a restaurant.

The Imagine centre is a joint venture between a group of Taiwanese investors, who financed the equipment and building, and the South District Sports Association of Shanghai, which supplied the land. The management is largely Taiwanese, but the balance of the staff was recruited locally. The Imagine centre's first major event will be the bowling competition in the inaugural East Asian Games, beginning 10th of May.

There are 522 lanes in China, a nation of 1.2 billion. Many bowling industry analysts predict that this vast nation could be the next major bowling boom.

KENT COUNTY TEAM ROLL OFF

The Kent County Team Roll Off was held this year at Bexleyheath Bowl, 29 men and 15 ladies contested the tournament, the prize for which was a County Card and a chance for selection into the County Team.

With again six teams of four from each centre bowling three games to decide the overall outcome with prizes for the 4 person team score, doubles and also singles scores, all with handicap, as indeed was the overall.

In the first game the Bexleyheath team of Steve White, Neil Webb, Alan Hart and Sheila White set the pace with games of 216, 179, 231 and 236 for an 862 scratch score, but further along the lanes the Dagenham team of Dean Clarke, Tony Clarke, Barry Myhill and Lee Lazarus bowled a team game of 815 with their handicap, Lee bowling a 201 and Barry a 207. Next to them, another Dagenham team of Jean Clarke, Lesley Pope, Marge Lazarus and Pat Webster bowled an 804 with handicap, Jean having a 221. Other 200's in the first game came from Steve Carnall 208, Fred Illings 216, both bowling for Dagenham. So after the first game Dagenham had 4542 and Bexleyheath 4532, just 10 pins in the lead.

The second game belonged to Dagenham by beating Bexleyheath by 157 pins with Steve Carnall having his second 200 of the day, a 224, with team mate Alan Webster, 216, backed up by Paul Freeman 191 and Siobhann Quirke 180 for a 811 scratch game, 833 including handicap. 200's were also bowled by Roy Ashendon for Dagenham and Steve White and Neil Webb from Bexleyheath.

So going into the last game Dagenham were a very large 167 pins in the clear. The third game, Steve Carnall bowled his third 200 plus game, a 201 for a very fine 633 series. Neil Webb and Alan Hart had their 2nd 200's of the day 214 and 205 respectively, this gave Alan a 612 series. Steve White could not make a third 200 but just enough to give him a 602 series. Dean Clarke, of the Dagenham team, after a slow start had a 236 last game.

In the final game Dagenham beat Bexleyheath, but this time by only 29 pins

and therefore took the overall by 196 pins. The winners of the fours trophy were Bexleyheath's Steve and Sheila White, Neil Webb, and Alan Hart with Dagenham's Dean and Tony Clarke, Barry Myhill and Lee Lazarus the runners up. The doubles winners were a family affair with brothers Dean and Tony Clarke just beating the sisters Brenda Reed and Lou Jackson. The singles was won by that man, or should we say lad, Dean Clarke and runner up was Steve Carnall.

After the bowling we all trundled into the bar for a buffet of Jacket Potatoes and Roast Beef with everyone reflecting their thoughts on the afternoon.

So with the score 1-1 the next round at Dagenham is eagerly awaited.

OLYMPIC LEAGUE

Before I begin, I must first correct an error I made in the last issue, I wrongly accredited Kevin Hollyhock with bowling a 632, it was his team mate Keith Andrews who bowled games of 200, 216, 216, well done Keith.

Eating humble over with I will now begin to tell you what has happened in the final seven weeks of the season.

In the last issue, Mean Machine had a bit of a lead with Glaze Rite second and The Highwaymen third. Well in the remaining weeks not a lot changed except the Mean Machine pulled further away from Glaze Rite who in turn pulled further away from The Highwaymen.

For the third successive season, The Mean Machine won the league, this time by 27 points from Glaze Rite who were 12 points ahead of The Highwaymen.

In the final weeks there was some good bowling, notably:

Week 27, The Pinbusters bowled a team game of 1010 and with their handicap took the Handicap Team High Series, with 1122, a 241 game from Jenni Sheepwash being the mainstay.

Tansel Oljay, of the Chessmen, had a 226 game in a 625 series with 225 from Mike Root and a 233 from Norman Roud also from the Chessmen. Marc Carver, from the Mean Machine, continued his very good form having a 662 series with games of 213, 223, 226.

Another cameo performance came from Neil Webb of Total Recall, 225, 175, 247 for a 647 series.

Week 28, this week saw 24 plus 200 games bowled but to cut a good story short, some of the larger games were from John O'Neill 233, Keith Alsop 233, Ed Lane 234, Chas Painter 235 (611), Jan Hodge 212, 219, 193 for 624, Marc Carver 247 (651) Steve White 212, 215, 211 for 638 and Keith Hodge 233. High team games came from Glaze Rite 1021 and Mean Machine 1007.

Week 29, by comparison was a bit quieter but Marc Carver kept his very good run going with games of 209, 236, 232 for a 677 series. 600's also coming from Steve Dodd 619 and Gary Harland 603.

Gavin Lightfoot had a funny night, bowling 21 pins more in his last game than he did in his first two!! 124, 125, 270. This 270 plus handicap was good enough to take the league's Individual High game with a 298.

Chris Skudder was unlucky having got the first six strikes of the Centre Jackpot just failed with the seventh to win the £300.

Marc Carver, in week 30, looked like his high scores were going to continue with an opening game of 247, but with the lanes drying rapidly his 155 and 160 meant he only bowled a 562. Marc's last 36 game average was a 206 and his last 12 games before tonight were 12 200+ games on the trot.

600's this week came from Keith Allsop 601 and Steve White 606. Chris (what's £300 anyway) Skudder had a last game of 238.

Week 31, and three 600's, one each from Roland Foxley 601, Phil Eldridge 625 (246 game) and Keith Hodge 601.
