## ARMISTICE DAY

MARCH 5th 1967

The dispute between the proprietors and the B.T.B.A. is as good as over. Since last June a lot has been written and a lot more has been said, what was not generally known however, was that a lot has also been DONE. Negotiations of this type are always delicate and whilst the end solution appears simple the discussions necessary to reach this compromise were quite lengthy and complicated.

As we know the proprietors association recommended to all their members that the B.T.B.A. should not be allowed to certify their lanes and they have been utilising the services of chartered surveyors in this field. The B.T.B.A. were unable to accept this as the surveyors only confirmed that the lanes met the proprietor's specifications (which were unknown), that the lanes fell within these specifications on the day of inspection and in addition no mention whatever was made of the equipment to include pin spotting. The B.T.B.A. certificate allowed for equipment in addition to lane specification and indicated that inspection facilities were allowed by the B.T.B.A. at any time during the continuance of the certificate. The specifications as laid down were known and conformed to those of the World association.

On the reverse side of this page we publish the official press release in full and basically this says that the B.T.B.A. will accept the surveyors certificate providing the specifications are known and published and on the understanding that any agreed discrepancy arising after inspection be put right. In addition the B.T.B.A. will inspect the lanes for any high score award to be given. Equipment and lanes will be included in the specifications and the B.T.B.A. certificate to be issued following the inspection will allow for continuance as before. These points have been agreed by both associations and the way ahead is now clear for complete co-operation and progress in the sole interests of the sport of tenpin bowling. We must all now look ahead and not backwards. May 1967 prove to be bowlings turnpoint.

#### Press Statement issued at 12 noon, Sunday March 5th, 1967 by the

#### National Tenpin Bowling Council

The National Tenpin Bowling Council, consisting of delegates from the Tenpin Bowling Proprietors' Association, the Manufacturers and the British Tenpin Bowling Association, has met and after a full and frank discussion on the problems confronting all sections with Tenpin Bowling interests reached unanimous agreement in principle on those important matters where disagreement has bedevilled the sport during the past year or so.

In particular a formula regarding Lane Certification and Sanctioning has been found satisfactory to all parties. A formal Lane Specification will be adopted by agreement between the B.T.B.A., the T.B.P.A. and the manufacturers, and such specification will be published. Proprietors may either arrange for an officer of the B.T.B.A. to measure the lanes and issue the certification or, alternatively, may employ a firm of qualified surveyors, which latter procedure is already mandatory for proprietors who are members of the T.B.P.A. The B.T.B.A. will accept a certificate over the signature of the qualified surveyor which states that the lane measurements are within the tolerances set out in the published specification agreed by the National Tenpin Bowling Council. Upon receipt of such certification the British Tenpin Bowling Association will issue its sanction.

It was agreed that the present Playing Rules should be accepted by the N.T.B.C. as the Rules of Tenpin Bowling and be vested in the N.T.B.C. with acknowledgments to the B.T.B.A. and to the American Bowling Congress, and that the B.T.B.A. Tournament Rules, in so far as they are appropriate, may be used in both sanctioned and un-sanctioned tournaments.

The Proprietors' Association recognises the need for a healthy "Players' Organisation" and the vital part the B.T.B.A. as such has to play. They have no wish or intention to promote any rival organisation and it is hoped that a close co-operation with the B.T.B.A. will develop resulting in better bowling and more bowlers.

There are many details to be worked out and to this end a working sub-committee consisting of the Chairman and Secretary of both the T.B.P.A. and the B.T.B.A. and representatives of the manufacturers has been set up with special reference to drawing up the formal Lane Specification.

### National Titles For S.E.B.A.

JESS MORLEY of Southend won the scratch All Events outright t the B.T.B.A. 6th. Annual Championships this year averaging over 200 for the nine games played. DORIN BAKER of Bexleyheath won the handicap ll Events Ladies title and BERNIE WHITE and LEN CROSS of Grays took the cratch Doubles title with a very fine 1250 series. A number of other owlers from S.E.B.A. centres also appear on the final unratified listings nd generally speaking we have fared very well. The tournament was a great success and many tournament records were broken. The Ambassador owl, Hounslow was packed to the doors for the whole of the three days and everyone appears to have been impressed by the standard of play and he organisation that is so necessary to an event of this importance.

### MEN'S TEAM EVENT - SCRATCH DIVISION

The Americans from Lackenheath set the target on Friday right with a great 2862 series. Teams from all over the country strove to overtake them but without success. The local side the WIMPEY MBASSADORS hit 2769 and the WINDSOR ROYALS a 2750. Other fancied teams uch as the Sherborne Rubber Rollers, London All Stars, Wembley Lions, Modern Classics, Magicote 5 Stars, Phoenix Five, Albro Wagoners, Regal ebels and Brady Rooftoppers came and went without overtaking them and fter nearly 100 five man teams had bowled the powerful men from the home of tenpin were declared 1967 winners. Of the teams entered from our own area some accredited thenselves very well and others couldn't find heir best form. The UNKNOWNS from Cliftonville made their presence felt s did the HELMSMEN, STARLINE PAINTS and the REGAL REBELS from Whitstable, Southend and Grays respectively. Worthy of special mention, however, is HE COMMITTEE from Bexleyheath who, you will see below actually finished n 7th place with a very creditable 2716. Playing against the title holders, Sherbornes, they were singularly unimpressed by reputation and in fact won both the first and second games against this famous side that ncludes Tony King, Maurice Depoiy and Les Williams. High scorer for our nome side was skipper BILL BRIDGE with 588, including a 224 game but all the team rolled very steadily and received good support from the number of upporters who had made the trip including bowl manager Jack Rowe.
