

ERIC TERRY HITS OUT

The 1968 Annual General Meeting of the B.T.B.A. was recently held at Coventry and, as always, your delegates were in attendance. B.T.B.A. Chairman Eric Terry was particularly outspoken in his opening address stating that the past year had been one of almost complete frustration. almost complete frustration so far as negotiations with the proprietors were concerned and the objectionable veto to the proprietors sanctioning any of their tournaments had not been rescinded and similarly B.T.B.A. were still having to accept lane certification by surveyors.

It was pointed out that B.I.B.A. did not ask for all proprietor's tournaments to be sanctioned or for all lames to be inspected by B.T.B.A. but did consider that in a democratic association that individual proprietors should be able to decide for themselves on the individual merits of their own case and should not be subject to an

apparent dictatorship.

B. F. B. A. Press Officer and Selection Committee Chairman, Teddy Tinling, spoke of the success of the British team in Malmo and of looking forward to the European Championships next year and the next World Championships in Milwaukee, U.S.A., in 1971. He pointed out that the achievements of all B.T.B.A. members in sanctioned play would be taken into account in future selections.

Council Member Harry Pearson Blackie rather shook the delegates when he told them that not only had all the council members not drawn any expenses for this year but that the General Secretary, Morris Glazer, was at present acting in an honorary, unpaid capacity and had been so for the past six months. These drastic measures had been taken to conserve the associations finances.

A considerable amount of discussion took place upon a proposed new constitution based upon county boundaries and another general meeting is to he held next month to decide upon all aspects of this before the new season commences in September.

New World Record

She is considered by many experts in the U.S.A. to be the greatest woman bowler of all time. We aren't going

The existing World Record series for ladies was a mighty 792 held jointly in the U.S.A. by Janet Harman and Millie Ignizio Martorella. A number of W.I.B.C. members have come very near to this total already this year including Gloria Bouvia of Portland with 770 and Mari Matsuzawa, Los Angeles and Jean Allen, Red Bank both with 771. Now at last the record, set originally in 1962 by Janet Harman and equalled only last season has gone to little 7 stone Ruby Chong of Richmond, California with 794! The diminutive Chinese-American rolling in the 940 Classic League at Golden Gate Lanes strung strikes galore for games of 279-290-225. It won't be long now before the first ever ladies 800 series is posted and don't be surprised if the girl to do it is Millie Ignizio Martorella! This fantastic left hander averaged 212 last season, the highest average ever held by a female bowler, equalled the previous high series, shot a perfect game in the Queens Tournament which she won after going into the final game some 60 pins down, won more money in tournaments than any lady has ever won in a season and to cap it all was voted Women Bowler of the Year by the American bowling press after being voted Star of Tomorrow the year before. They wern't kidding' So far this season Millie has posted a series of 768 and taken a few thousand dollars in the first of the seasons tournaments.

S. E. B. A. 'S 2nd 700 !

Rolling in the Cliftonville Seaside League two weeks ago with his team, the CATFISH, MIKE LUCKHURST opened his first game with ten strikes in a row to record a game of 288. Dropping off in his second game for a game of only 162 he came back with the strikes again in the final game for a 256 to total 706. This is the second 700 set rolled in the area and stands second to Jack Morton's 734 shot last season at Bexleyheath. Well done Mike, may it be the first of many.



England Retain Triple Crown

The first ever Triple Crown for tenpin bowling was held last year in Glasgow between England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales and was won outright by the English team. The second of this now annual event was held last month in Llanelli and once again England swept the board. Some very fine bowling was witnessed culminating in the English men's team shooting a fine 3041. England came 1st, 2nd and 3rd in men's and ladies all events with Chris Buck at the head closely followed by World Champion David Pond and Steve Russell from Bradford and in the female division Ann Garrett from Wembley took the honours with Meg Coombes from Gateshead in second place and S.E.B.A. member Wyn Collison third. B.T.B.A. vs U.S.A.F.

This now annual match was held at Wembley Stadium Bowl on 8th. June. The top six male and female teams from the B.T.B.A. Championships are invited to compete over six games against similar side from the United States Air force stationed in the United Kingdom. The first event held at Wembley in 1966 was won by B.T.B.A. but the Americans took the overall prize back last year at Lakenheath. B.T.B.A. again reversed positions in 1968 and now hold the trophy again having taken overall pinfall by something in the region of 500 pins. The bowling was really first class with big 200 games the order of the day and the high game for the event being taken to a lofty 279 by one of the Americans. Bill Helsel of U.S.A. took the All Events in the men's division with a 207 average and Britain's Audrey Pond from Hoddesdon played magnificently to win the ladies section with an average of 196.
