BRITAIN WIN 1ST LEG OF EMILLO DE MIGUEL

As predicted the British team won their zone of the 1st Annual Emilio de Miguel Tournament in Breda, Holland last month and look like they will be playing Italy in the finals. This event, the bowling equivalent of the European Cup in Football is zoned and the winners of each zone play the finals. B.T.B.A. pick the team to represent this country and F.I.Q. govern the event.

With lead-off man Dave Pond and anchor Terry Sullivan both opening with a 132 game the first team game against the home country, Holland, looked anything but hopeful with a 790: Holland opened with 911. The second game, however, was a complete reversal. Holland went down 1039 to 836 with Dave and Terry making amends in a big way with respective games of 212 and 233. Britain fired 924 to the Dutchmen's 906 in the final game to take the match 2753 to 2653. A great come back from an early disaster.

As a one time member of S.E.B.A. with a few bowling centres spread over quite a few miles, it came as something of a shock to find that my new home town of Detroit boasts no fewer than 116 centres with the Greater Detroit Bowling Association having 220 within it's borders. The largest establishment is the 84 lane Satellite Bowl in Dearborn Heights and the smallest a 2 laner in Wayne County Training School in The 220 bowls house 2970 sanctioned leagues and the local Northville. association has no fewer than 129,911 members!

14-Year-Old Rolls 299, 704

The 14-year-old youth recently came up with a 299 game in a series of 704 in the Prep League at Bill Williams' Ha-Prep League at Bill Williams na-zel Park Bowl, where Chris owns a bright 188 average. Earlier this season, Chris, whose brother, Dick, already is an established star, registered a 728 series in the same league, Williams reported,

CINCINNATI -- John Caras of Philadelphia became the 20th man in the 65-year history of the American Bowling Congress tourna-ment to roll a perfect score in the tourney.

A last - minute sub, Caras, 28, fired his 300 in the singles of the current event at Cincinnati. He would up with a series of 626.

Detroit - area bowlers among the leaders as of March 4 are Bob Hitt, Hal Jolley and Bob Chamberlain, who hold down the first three places in regular all-events with 9-game counts of 1901, 1894 and 1890, respectively, and Gaston Marcois and James Knoll, second in regular doubles with 1259.

Balky 10-Pin Costs Buzz Fazio **ABC Masters Championship**

CINCINNATI -- Pete Tountas wept as he watched a 10-pin fail to fall and he became the champion of the 1968 American Bowling Congress Masters tournament,

The balky pin was the first ball in the tenth frame of the last game rolled by 60-year-old Buzz Fazio. Fazio, born the same year the ABC tournament first came to Cincinnati, 1908, became the sen-sation of the tournament when he weathered six straight matches and moved unbeaten into the finals re-

cently.
Tountas was forced into the loser's bracket by Fazio, ironically, earlier in the tournament, 876 to 855. The native of Greece, now living in Tueson, Ariz., swept a-side name pros Bob Strampe, Bill Johnson, last year's Masters runnerup, and Jim Stefanich, an early favorite in the tournament in moving to the title match.

Fazio, alone in the winner's bracket, and Tountas, the survivor of the loser's bracket, met head-on in Cincinnati's Convention -Exposition center, where the ABC tournament is being held on specially installed lanes. If Fazio could capture the first match, the title would be his.

Tountas, with his unorthodox, no-slide delivery, rolled 882 to stay alive, with Fazio hitting 821. Then they moved to another pair, and Fazio opened the second match with 208. Tountas fell to 181. Fazio pulled even farther ahead the second game with 233 while the tall, slender Greek hit 210. But then a 199 by Fazio and 232 by Tountas closed the gap.

Still 28 pins behind after six

frames of the fourth game, Tountas came back with four straight strikes and a 224 finish, Fazio needed two strikes in the tenth frame to win. The unbelieveable pressure of the most prestigious bowling tournament of its type was on. Fazio rolled the first ball, left the 10-pin, and it was all over, Tountas wept.

"I rolled 20 games today and I'm exhausted," said the 29-year-old champion, who suffers from a knee injury and he has to wear a special elastic bandage. Under the tiresome pressure, though, the New Masters King averaged 220 for 40 games in the bournament. He set a record for money win-nings in one Masters, collecting \$4,500, including \$50 for qualifying and \$50 for each match one, along with a \$4,000 first prize, He won nine matches and lost one.



- the Bank provides a statement of account MONTHLY and that the account is posted to YOU. After checking what should be in the Bank with the amount that is there pass the statement duly signed to your treasurer for his file.
- at least TWO SIGNATURES are required before any money can be paid out by the Bank. YOUR signature must be one of these and the other can be either the Secretary or Treasurer.

These simple duties will ensure that your league's presentation is a happy one. We KNOW you trust the treasurer. We KNOW he's a friend of yours - but do your job anyway. The funds of YOUR league are your personal responsibility. Don't let your league or yourself down!

Does your League Secretary work 52 weeks a year compiling your average, your team standing etc, etc, etc? GIVE HIM A BREAK.

When the new season starts in September elect both a Secretary AND an Assistant Secretary. The assistant can be shown everything there is to know about the job and can then take over for holidays; in the event of illness or even for the Summer schedule.

GIVE YOUR HARDWORKING SECRETARY A HOLIDAY TOO!!!

Is <u>your</u> League Secretary paid for doing the job? He should be. Whether 6d or 1/-d per player per week is paid to him or whether he does the job and has free bowling in the league he should receive <u>some</u> reward. Should he not do a proper job you then have a right to complain. If you expect everything for nothing you cannot really moan if the job is not done properly!
