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## TOURNAMENT BOREDOM

There was a time when a bowling tournament was an event in the calendar and was guaranteed success just because it was a tournament. In 1971 exactly the opposite is the case and there are one, two three or even four tournaments every week-end of the year. What used to be something to look forward to has become, in so many cases, a bore with the number of entries reflecting this. Even the major national contests are suffering from 'tournament over exposure' and if a 1971 entry even equals the 1969 or 1970 counterpart the organiser is delighted.

The reason for the flood is obvious - a tournament is a good way to start off or round off a week's business and if the centre up the road is running a variety of events the manager cannot sit back and see his own bowlers bolstering another centre's takings week after week without doing something about it. The successful bowling centres were, almost invariably, those with a good and regular tournament programme that bolstered their bread and butter league and open play. Now every bowl runs quite regular tournaments both on a local and national basis and with the number of centres that there are in this country the total number of events per year is formidable.

How can a tournament once again become an event to be looked forward to? How can clashing dates be avoided for events in close proximity to one another? How can tournament boredom be avoided in 1972?

The first job is for all bowling companies, area associations and tournament promoters to agree to help themselves. Already it must be agreed that one very successful event at a particular centre is better than three or four poorly supported ones and there should be no reason why, with the problems removed, every tournament should not be a guaranteed success. How? One person must be put in charge of all tournament sanctioning and that person must keep the tournament calendar right up to date. Also he must tell the tournament promoter that the date he has picked for his event is unwise and he should give him an alternative. His knowledge

of the tournament scene must be considerable and he must know when one tournament can, in fact, compliment another and when one can kill off another or at worst make both unsuccessful. Sanctions would be given on a first come, first served basis and the Liason Committee could decide upon any disputes. Some people will say that a centre should be allowed to run its own business in its own way and generally they are right. A little assistance for the good of the industry generally, however, cannot come amiss at this stage, particularly if a scheme can save our tournament scene from complete apathy.

## Great Britain to host 1975 FIQ Championships

Great Britain was awarded the 8th Federation Internationale des Quilleurs (FIQ) World Bowling Championships Aug. 19 as 69 delegates from more than 30 countries voted unanimous approval.

Morris Glaser made Great Britain's presentation, and upon acceptance said, "We offer our hospitality to you bowlers of the world." He said the tournament would be held at a similar time of the year (August), although no definite date or host city had been assigned.

The only other bid for the 1975 FIQ was made by the Japan delegation. However, after a brief recess, the Japanese withdrew the bid with the provision that they would bid for the 1979 FIQ tournament.

Announcements were made the following day as to the sites of the upcoming zones championships.

Bogota, Colombia was announced as the site for the 1973 American Zone FIQ tournament. The European FIQ championships will be held in 1973 in Vienna, Austria. The Asian Zone championships will be held in Malaysia in 1972.

## Meyers notches fifth 800 series

Norm Meyers of St. Louis has replaced Casey Jones of Plymouth, Wis. as the second best 800 series shooter in a single season. The 37 year old Meyers slammed an 803 set July 25 in the Crest Bowl Scratch Doubles tournament, his fifth 800 in 1970-71. Earlier he registered totals of 847, 816, 815 and 806. Jones rolled four 800s in the 1966-67 season.

The alltime leader with six in a single campaign (1966-67), Elvin Mesger of Sullivan, Mo., also increased his ABC record lifetime total to 17 in 1970-71, rolling an 804 last October.

## RULE OF THE MONTH



### RULE 13 - BOWLING ON WRONG LANE

Where only one person or the lead-off persons on both teams bowl on the wrong lanes and the error is discovered before another player has bowled, a dead ball shall be declared and the player(s) required to re-bowl on the correct lane(s).

When more than one player on the same team has bowled on the wrong lane, the game shall be completed without adjustment and the next game shall be started on the correctly scheduled lane.

In singles match play competition, where a player bowls two frames each time it is his turn to bowl, and a player bowls on the wrong lane for these two frames, a dead ball shall be declared and the player required to re-bowl both frames on the correct lanes providing the error is discovered prior to the time the opposing player has made a legal delivery. If the error is not discovered until the opposing player has bowled, the score shall count and the player shall be required to bowl his subsequent frames on the correct lanes.

\* The American professionals outdid themselves in the South Bend, Indiana P.B.A. Tournament and between them registered no fewer than eleven perfect games. The winner, BARRY ASHER, rolled a new 6 game record series of 1585 - an average of 264!

\* PETER BRIGHT of the Basildon DOZEN LEAGUE playing for the Spiders vs Fiends picked up the Big 4 split. The season's first.
