Any business that loses money must eventually close down. This is obvious and has been the reason why a number of bowling centres have been lost to the sport over the years. The reasons why they couldn't keep in the black were myriad but, generally, appeared to revolve around the policies and knowhow of various management at all levels of the industry. Other centres were unfortunate enough - from the bowlers point of view - to be sited on land that became valuable to the property magnates. value spiral has been the second cause of centres closing despite the bowl making a working profit and Stamford Hill and Leytonstone could well have fallen into this category. If a centre makes an annual nett return of, say, £10,000 and a property company offers to purchase it for £500,000 because of the worth of the land the bowling proprietor cannot justifiably refuse 50 years operational profit particularly when that company has shareholders. The third case for a profitable centre closing down is the policy of a Head Office who decides, regardless, to get out of the bowling business and sell or close everything and this was the case both with Top Rank and Magnet.

How safe is your centre and what is the future of the sport in this country? Dusting the cobwebs from our crystal ball we will endevour to answer these questions that are becoming more and more

prevalent from our members as each week goes by.

If your local bowling centre obviously does good business at all levels, i.e. bowling, restaurant and bar etc, is not situated on valuable land that is subject to redevelopment and where the proprietors are not contemplating getting out of the bowling business you would seem to have a hopeful future. If business doesn't appear good - and don't base your views in this respect solely on the night that your league bowls - or if the bowl sits on valuable redevelopment land the future could be questionable. The future of the sport generally? Good. Succesfull bowls - and there are still plenty of them - are doing better business now than at any time in the last three or four years. Many of these are situated well away from redevelopment areas or are above existing shopping complexes and providing their owners can think of nothing more profitable to take their place there is no reason why they should not still be open in the next century. Belle Vue, Coventry, Crawley, Dagenham, Hoddesdon, Hounslow, Harrow, Tolworth, Sheffield, Peterborough (now operated by the local Council), Wokingham, Walton and Worthing are just a very few of those that would seem to come under these categories and, of course, new centres have opened in the past two years and there is every possibility or more still to come. This publication is confident that those who wish to bowl will always have a centre in which to play the game but like most things your night or nights out might eventually necessitate some travelling. The Ambassador Bowl, Harlow closed down this month but the Classic League has negotiated a spot with Dagenham and under Peter Allin's organisation now travels to and from Harlow every Sunday evening by coach. (Continued page 2) Leytonstone bowlers are already fitted in and the International League, who have twice lost their home, are still hoping for room amid all the time shunting that has occurred in an endevour to fit everyone in. When the Cliftonville Bowl closed for a period two years ago the majority of the bowlers were found spots at neighboring Whitstable, Grays bowlers went to Basildon and Chatham bowlers to Bexleyheath or Whitstable again. Where there is a will there is a way. Keep playing the game, keep supporting your centre, keep trying to introduce new blood into the sport and last but certainly not least, be optomistic and plan for the future. Bowling does have one, of this we are sure:


RULE 122 - DEFAULTING MORE THAN ONCE

When a team or individual defaults more than once in a season, such team or individual may be expelled from the league, and in addition shall be liable for suspension from the B.T.B.A.

Defaulting means failing to show up for a league committment without reason and any team or individual who does this more than once in a season is liable to suspension. Such a team or individual is of no use to the league as, apart from giving the opposing team a boring walkover, action of this kind can often decide a league championship and cause considerable bad feeling. Point out to all your league this season 1972/73 that they all have entered into a verbal contract with the other league members to play of membership in B.T.B.A. can result and every league bowler should be made to realise his responsibilities.

The lenes at the Cliftonville Bowl were in excellent condition throughout as the scores testified. The standard was set from the very first squad on the Seturday evening when the Committee pairing of BRIAN NEWSDN(649) and ALAN CHAPMAN(570) totalled 1219 scratch and 1315 with handicap added. This score, in fact, stood until the 1.30p.m. squad the following day when TONY BLANCHETT(625) and GEOFF BUCK(628) made 1253 and 1319 plus handicap which was to stand the test of the remaining six squads for top prize in each division. PAT DUGGAN(607) and ROGER BRIGHT(605) for the Nomads ran the top placings closely as did DOUG WHITE(589) and GEORGE NELSON(624) for Margametics and PAUL CRUNDELL(602) and JOHN ELDER(602) for the Cliftonville All Stars.

The ladies section of the event was wide open until the 7.15p.m. on Sunday night squad when BERTHA WILL with a fine 608 scratch series and partner AUDREY POND with 54% made a 1306 total with handicap only to be topped by the Playgirl duo of JENNY SHIELDS and MARJIE BALLINGALL. Jennie who carries a 164 average made a 526 set but it was 145 average Marjie who had never bowled a 600 series in her life who made it 'Marjie's Day' with games of 190-204-214 for 608. This timely performance gave the girls top placing in the division and would, infact, have won them the regular handicap title had they had the temerity to enter with the men! Well done Marjie - Concorde star 1972!

Including re-entries a total of 43 teams battled out the third year of the OLD SPICE 'Kessex' Doubles with the first four games being bowled at Bexleyheath and the second four, to make an 8 game total, played at Dagenham. Over his eight games GORDON HOLLIER of the Wembley All Stars bowled a remarkable total of 1678 for an average of nearly 210 and assured his team of the top placing. Others with 200 plus averages at each centre were GEORGE STEER with an 803 at Bexleyheath and BOBBY MANSFIELD, MICK OLLEY and JIM BREWER at Dagenham with 868, 836 and 816 respectively. Mick Olley had the high game of 265 with 8X in a row. Total prize fund was £141 and in addition gift packs were presented to the top teams in each division plus a sample 'OLD SPICE' for each contestant.
