CLIFTONVILLE win the INTER-CENTRE with RECORD ENTRY of NINE CENTRES

There was a record entry this year for the Kent InterCentre Tournament. Nine of the ten centres within the KTBA's catchment area sent teams. The tournament was held at AMF Margate tenpin bowling centre on Sunday 15th July 2001. For some of the newer Centres it was their first taste of this kind of event. The tournament is played for the honour of being the Kent Inter Centre Champions and the "Kent winning team takes the Messenger" trophy to display in their home centre for the year.

The tournament consists of seven different events giving the opportunity for ladies, gentlemen, junior and the over 50s a chance to compete against each other. Points are awarded for each event – 10 for first place, 7 for second, 5 for third, 3 for fourth and 1 for fifth and at the end of the tournament each team has to select one event to drop from their points tally.

The tournament got under way with the Doubles events - Men's Doubles and Senior Mixed Doubles.

MENS DOUBLES

The men's doubles event was the most hotly contested event with six of the teams averaging over 400 per Nine players rolled series in game. excess of 600 - Steve Williams 614, Justin Shaw (Bexleyheath) Costello Dan (Gravesend) 626, (Tunbridge Wells) 649, Steve Brough Smith Chris (Margate) 653. and Dave Ross (Cliftonville) 662 (Whitstable) 688. The top three bowlers in the event all scored series Jerry Moll (Chatham) above 700. achieved his first 700+ series in sanctioned play with a 703 comprising games of 221, 232 and 250. Daniel Harman (Margate) bowled a 714 series with games of 265, 279 and 170.

The day's most spectacular achievement was the 774 series bowled by Whitstable's Pete Williams. He recorded a superb 774 series, which included a 300 game. He actually bowled 23 strikes in a row, five at the end of the first game, 12 in the second and six at the start of the third. His first game was a 247 and the last a

The Whitstable Doubles team score (1462) equalled the Kent Record for Men's Doubles Series, which was set by Margate's Steve Brough and Daniel Harman just a few months ago. Williams and Ross's highest game score of 535 is a new Kent record.

Needless to say, Whitstable came first. Winning scores and points for the event were as follows:

SENIOR MIXED DOUBLES

The Senior Mixed doubles event is aimed at players over 50 years old. An extra pin is added to the score for each year the competitor is over 50 years old (players under 50 get one pin per year deducted).

Cliftonville's Tom Sawyer was the highest scoring man with a 609 scratch series, which included an excellent 235 game. With his wife, Sandy, their joint total secured the winning score.

Chatham's Jan Smith was the highest scoring lady in the event with a 534 scratch series. She and husband Bob took the second place points.

The team from Bexleyheath, Alan Petherick and Beryl Drury had the most bonus pins, picking up 41 per game. They finished in third place.

Laure Sutherland claimed the five points for Chatham, taking third place with a 505 series including a 203 game. Whitstable took fourth place and Cliftonville was fifth.

MENS SINGLES

Andy Allerton rolled games of 200, 205 and 250 for an excellent 655 series and 10 points for Margate. John Smith finished in second place for Cliftonville with a 641 series, which included games of 216 and 257. Rob Packman bowled a 605 series, including games of 215 and 201, to take third place. Tunbridge Wells were fourth and Chatham fifth.

LADIES TRIOS

Cliftonville ladies 1448 team series took the ten points for first place. Sally Wells rolled the highest ladies series and game of the day with a 572 series and a 230 game.

Bexleyheath ladies were second with a 1434 team series. Janet May was their highest scorer with a 501 series.

The Chatham team was third with 1401 team series. Top scorer for Chatham was Tracy Saunders, contributing a 524 series. Whitstable took fourth and Margate fifth.

After a break for lunch the two team events got under way on freshly prepared lanes.

JUNIOR FOUR PERSON TEAM

The junior event was for a Four person team with at least two of the players required to be under 16 years old. There were some good scores recorded.

Open to all bowlers, ladies, men, juniors or seniors but bowlers have to comply with restrictions on entering averages.

One bowler - 199 and under One bowler - 189 and under One bowler - 179 and under One bowler - 169 and under and One bowler - 159 and under.

(Whitstable) Colin Johnson achieved the highest series with 637, which included games of 236 and 231. His teammate, Steve Gore achieved the fourth highest series, 606 - including a 221 and a 205 game. Even with these scores Whitstable could only finish in third place. The second highest series in the event was bowled by Mel Allerton from the Margate team. His 629 series included a 224 game. The Margate team finished in second place. Top team was Chatham for whom Keith Porter was leading scorer, his 608 series included games of 212 and 217. The qualifying round for the adult competition was held on one day at Cheltenham on Sunday 2nd September. The men bowled eight games and the ladies seven. This meant there was an 8.30am start and a 7.15pm finish for the Kent teams and I felt that it should have been run over two days as originally agreed when the tournament was reformatted, as we had an overnight stay anyway.

REGULAR MEN win and LADIES finish THIRD in their GROUP

Pauline Debutantes Hogg [Orpington] and Sandra Smith [Bexleyheath] joined some familiar names in the ladies team for Kent's opening foray in the 2001 Inter-County Championship. By the end of the day we had all experienced the tension and excitement that makes the County Championship such a unique event.

Each five-man team plays every other county on a head to head basis with pinfall plus bonus points for victory determining the top teams. Three teams qualify for the

Kent ladies got off to a great start with a win against Hampshire, always a strong team. Word filtered through that the Kent men were struggling against South Wales; 70 pins down in the ninth they pulled off a remarkable finish with 17 strikes in a row and all five bowlers turkeying out, to pull off an unlikely win as the anchor for South Wales missed a spare in the tenth. Shellshocked Welshmen were seen wondering about for the rest of the day. Jason Bass & Steven Letchford making their first appearances in the men's team had a real baptism of fire and Sean Purcell, returning after several years' absence, also played his part.

The men's second game against Dorset also proved to be a close contest with only eight pins proving the difference between the teams. John Hinch proved the star turn this time with a 226 Game.

The ladies meanwhile were taking on the ladies of South Wales but didn't need to repeat the men's escape act to clock up another win.

Game 3 saw the first defeat of the day for the ladies who were caught napping by Wiltshire who after a slow start were to prove a thorn in our side all day. Kent men had now settled in to a great rhythm

and were clearly the form team on the day they never looked back and went on to win all their games growing in confidence as the day progressed. As the averages show they all contributed and a team average of 198.0 was an excellent performance.
