The Kent Under 24's teams travelled to Nottingham on the weekend of 28th and 29th February 2004 to take part in the Inter County Championships. Sadly the lads couldn't retain their title won last year but both teams, male and female, bowled superbly. Both teams made the finals and continued to bowl well.

22 teams entered the men's competition and the Kent team qualified for the Round Robin Final in 5th place. The biggest achievement was Ben Frost of Whitstable bowling his first 300 game. He did this in his first series of the qualifying round and continued to bowl well throughout qualifying finishing with a 206.11 average over 9 games. Ben also achieved the highest series of the Kent team with 678 which he rolled in the Round Robin Finals. Ben Frost achieved the highest overall average with 212.5 over 15 games. The team average over 64 games was a superb 198.5 but was only good enough for the Kent team to finish in 5th place.

12 teams were entered into the ladies competition and the Kent ladies qualified for the final in 4th position. The ladies team put in some excellent performances. The real star of the day was Jenny Beale who averaged 203.9 over 15 games. The highest series for the Kent ladies came from Emily Frost who rolled a brilliant 668 series. Samantha Denne contributed the highest game for the team with 247. The ladies averaged 185.6 over the 64 games but were only able to finish in 7th place.

THE BERT & VICKY TIMMS MEMORIAL MIXED DOUBLES TOURNAMENT—26TH OCT '03

After last year's relatively poor attendance at Maidstone (only 32 entries overall), there were high hopes that Bugsy's at Cliftonville would threaten the near maximum entries achieved at Whitstable in 2001. However as the entries started arriving, it was clear that this was not to be the case, especially when there were no entries from the home centre. However, by the day of the competition there were 28 entries, the majority of which were in the afternoon squads.

Although the morning entries were low, those that took part all enjoyed the lane condition, with 9 games of 200+ from Mike Eason, Carole Lakin, Adrian Conner (2), Gavin Grant (2), Stuart Ashdown, Peter Myhill and Kirsty Belchem. Adrian produced the highest scratch series of 604. With 3 re-entries a total of 11 teams took part in the morning session. Very disappointing, since these squads usually fill up quickly.

At the end of the morning session, Gavin Grant and Kirsty Belchem led the tournament with a handicap score of 1,325 followed by Adrian and Christine Conner with 1,276.

The afternoon session was far busier for yours truly, with a full squad for the 2.15pm squad. Scores again were high. Although nobody managed to score 600+, there were scores of 579 from Tex Moustache, 593 from Philip Green and 583 from Gavin Grant (including the highest game of the day of 253). The six other 200+ games were scored by Fred Spears, Tex Moustache, Tom Sawyer, Philip Green, Colin Evans and Simon Skudder. At the end of this squad, Colin Evans and Dee Faldon had beaten Gavin and Kirsty's score by 4 pins to lead the tournament with a score of 1,329. Gavin and Kirsty remained in second place and third place was still held by Adrian and Christine.

With 10 teams out of a possible 12, the 3.30pm squad was again busy, re-entries making sure the squad was nearly full. High scoring once more with Craig Lambkin producing 243-172-247 for the highest scratch series of the day of 662. No other 600+ series but 200+ games were scored by Jerry Moll, Kevin Snook, Philip Green, Ben Frost and Fred Spears. Craig was ably supported by his partner, Natasha Krajewska (163-174-175) giving them a combined handicap score of 1,369 and they took the lead from Colin and Dee.

The final squad at 4.45pm consisted of 8 teams, mostly made up of re-entries, having only received 3 entries before the day. The scores were fairly consistent but not enough to challenge the top three positions. Top team in this squad were last year's winners Jack Denne and daughter Sam with a handicap score of 1301 followed by Mandi and Peter Buckley with 1279, good enough to make fourth and fifth positions respectively. Highest scratch score for the squad came from Paul Tuff (581) followed by Ben Frost (572). 200+ games were scored by Alan McPherson, Samantha Denne (2), Mandi Buckley (2), Paul Tuff and Ben Frost.

The high series (handicap) was taken by Emily Frost who had a fantastic 699 scratch series (750 with h'cap). The Early Birds League reached the halfway stage of the 2003-4 season at the end of December 2003. There have been some high scores registered.
